TROOPS FOR CHINA

To Be Drawn From South Africa.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—In connection with the prediction made by Sir Robert Hart that there will be further hostilities in China, the Associated Press understands that the British Government is already considering the transfer of troops from South Africa to India in order to make it practicable to send more British troops to China.

The military authorities consider the war in South Africa so far ended that troops may be safely moved.

RETURNING CANADIANS.

Honors in Store in England.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—The War Office has decided to invite a details of officers and men from each Colonial corps in South Africa to visit England as guests of the nation, as soon as it becomes possible to reduce the force in South Africa.

KRUGER TO LEAVE

On the Herzog for Holland.

LISBON, Sept. 17.—The Portuguese government has telegraphed to the government of Mozambique authorizing the departure of Kruger for Europe. The governor, however, must satisfy himself that Kruger is really going to Europe. Meanwhile he is instructed to take all precautions to safeguard the personal security of Kruger.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—Mrs. Kruger, according to a despatch to the Express, has arrived in Lorenzo Marquez.

LISBON, Sept. 17.—The newspapers here say that Kruger will take the German steamer Herzog at Marques. His destination is to be Holland, by way of Marseilles.

A Japanese Appointed.

LONDON, Sept. 15. A special despatch from Shanghai announces that a Japanese official has been appointed to succeed Mr. J. McLeary Brown, the English financial director and Commissioner of Customs of Corea.

Return of the Emperor.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The Japanese general, Yamaguchi, telegraphed to his Government from Peking, September 6, that the Emperor's Chamberlain had just arrived. This probably means that some signs are on foot for the return of the Emperor. Other Japanese advices report that Peking is returning to its normal condition. Order is being restored. The Chinese refugees are coming back, and foreign residents are leaving to recuperate.
