#### Dr. Randolph Murchison Is Mourned By Community

The beautiful fernlands were when we came to a veranda this morning. The sun not too long since was sending long fingers of gold down from the eastern hills to light brightly the far side of the valley above the millstream. And it came to mind that over strange hillsides and down across that stream one comes to at last a close, which takes one to that vale that is eternity, a lad of the district whose name has been much in the mind and on the lips of folks far and wide recently, was now gone.

A lad of the district this, though adopted as their doctor by another island community, his name had through the years become a loved name in homes where he brought his gift of healing, his encouragement and kindly sympathy. Now his last round made, last earthly cell part, he had responded to a far summons, and spirit as always willing and ready was now gone home.

We remembered, as women will think on these things, how at the funeral of his father, who was, and is still reverently spoken of as "The Doctor" in this country, side and further, it was the mother young and older who mourned most obviously his passing. They grieved for the good and kindly friend who had brought them safely through the valley of the shadow to live and tend and love the precious babes of their "breast". It would be the same today, we knew, of this gifted son whose remains were to be interred in a cemetery of that district he had served for 10 1/2 years.

As our world was the poorer for his father's passing back in the years, so that countryside which knew him best professionally and as a good friend mourned, and will continue to mourn his loss. Folks too will sympathize deeply with the good lady who by assistance rendered so willingly and her unfailing interest in his patients, and kindness, filled so faultlessly her position as a country doctor's wife.

Only those country-born and reared can have any idea of the worth to country-folks of the rural practitioner. Indeed we much doubt they themselves can realize the extremely important place they occupy in our lives. How our fears over an ailing loved one drop away at his step on our threshold! And how well esteemed and beloved he can become as a counsellor and friend.

A lad of the district, this doctor we mourn—a seat-mate of James in the school down the River Road. A happy-hearted, gentlemanly boy, a clever student, a young and gallant soldier... and James so happy, we recall, to be among the first to welcome him home at World War I's close.

Tonight all that was mortal of this man rests not far from his chosen home of the year. A graceful white birch marks the place and just below a millpond marks off the passing season. And what of the spirit? In one of those appealing books by the Scottish Isabel Cameron we remember that scene where The Doctor (a healer of souls) chatted with his old friend the Rev. Ian Guthrie by the manse-hearth after a visit with "Peter" an aged parishioner, then nearing life's close.

"I often wonder," the Doctor said, "who will greet us first on the other side. Do you know, I have an idea Peter's mother will come to meet him. Peter was in many ways a boy all ways and I think—I think—that God always sends mothers to greet and welcome their boys when they cross the river."

"I think," said the Rev. Ian gently, "I think the first to greet you Doctor, will be your old friend, whom you loved and loved on earth—the Lord Himself!"

So we think the Doctor's mother, a gracious little lady, has greeted him. And there too with his father and the other loved ones gone before gathered about him, smiling kindly on the scene and whispering a commending, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant" was the Great Physician and Healer of souls... "The Lord Himself!"

**BUY ARMS**  
JAKARTA, Indonesia (Reuters)—Indonesia has bought light arms for 20 battalions from the United States, the Indonesian news agency Antara said Wednesday. Col. Ahmed Jani, head of the arms buying mission, said the arms were purely for Indonesia's internal security and defence and would not be used against Dutch-held West New Guinea, which Indonesia claims as its own.

BERLIN (Reuters)—West Berlin refugee officials said Tuesday that during the first six months of this year 393 East German university lecturers and teachers, 443 engineers and technicians and 138 doctors fled to West Berlin. A total of 740 refugees fled from East to West Germany in the same period.

**INDIAN-CYLON DINNER AT HOME**  
Canned Pomegranate or Papaya Juice  
Canned Mulligatawny Soup  
Curry of Lamb Flakes Rice  
Dhal Cut Green Beans  
Fresh Mangoes or pineapple Hot or Iced Coffee, Tea, Milk  
NOTE: Canned pomegranate juice is on sale in specialty food stores and some supermarkets. Measurements are level; recipes for 6.

Curry of Lamb: Cut 3 lbs boned, fat-free breast of lamb into bite-sized pieces. Lightly brown in butter. Add to the following curry sauce. Cover. Simmer 1 hr. When done, stir in 1/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice.

Indian Curry Sauce: Comparatively mild in flavor. For a "hot" curry stir in an extra 1/2 tsp. curry powder. Use this sauce in preparing chicken, meat, fish, or egg curry or a curry of mixed vegetables.

To make: Melt 3 tsp. butter; add 1/4 c. sliced peeled onion, 1/2 c. thin-sliced peeled carrot and 1/2 c. shredded green beans. Sauté until limp. Stir in 2 tsp. flour, 2 1/2 c. mashed canned tomato, 2 c. boiling water and 2 bouillon cubes. Simmer 15 min. Add 1/4 c. fine-chopped tart apple and 1 tsp. chopped chutney. Simmer 5 min. longer. Dhal: Pour 1 qt. boiling water over 1 c. green lentils. (or use split green or yellow peas). Add 1 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. cardamom seeds. Cover. Let stand 30 min. Add 1/4 tsp. each powdered clove and garlic and 1/2 tsp. powdered bay leaf. Bring to rapid boil. Then simmer-1 1/2 hrs., or until lentils are soft. Water should evaporate about 2/3.

Melt 2 tsp. butter. Add 1 small-diced peeled onion and 1/2 tsp. curry powder. Stir-fry; stir into Dhal. Continue to cook until onion is very soft. Rub through coarse sieve. This tasty sauce should be the consistency of thick gravy.

Then I chose lamb curry, the Chef chose shrimp curry, both served with mixed vegetables, rice and dhal, which is a wonderful Indian vegetable sauce. Diced raw onion and celery and chutney accompanied this course. For dessert, fresh mangoes, just arrived at the market.

"The best way to enjoy this delicious fruit," said the Chef, "is to eat it like a banana. Just stick the mango on a dinner fork,
