300 Maritime Firemen Will Attend Tournament

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
The 4th annual Summerside Lobster Carnival will get a big boost this year in helping celebrate this gala event as more than 300 firemen from the three Maritime Provinces come to town for their Maritime Firemen's Tournament which will be held on the third day of the carnival, Friday, July 17.

This is the first firemen's tournament to be held in Summerside and residents and visitors will no doubt be much amused at the many antics and unorthodox items included in their tournament program.

Their "night shirt parade" to be held midnight Friday is expected to keep many people from getting to bed early as they parade around the town in night shirts and other night attire whooping it up.

ANNUAL MEETING
The firemen's headquarters while in Summerside will be at the curling rink and their annual meeting will be held there, on Wednesday July 15th at 2.30 p.m. A firemen's ball and luncheon will follow that evening.

The following day they will take part in the mammoth parade, the department from the RCAF Station will give a fire-fighting demonstration at Queen

Elizabeth Park at 8.00 p.m., and a street dance, in their honor, will close out the daily celebration at 10.00 p.m. in front of Bob Bank's Service Station on Notre Dame Street.

On Friday at 2.00 p.m. the firemen's sports program will be run off with prizes totalling \$740 plus cups and trophies to the winning departments. Their sports program consists of hose reel race, ladder race, replacement race, hose coupling race, duty race, one-mile relay and 100-yard dash.

MARCHING ABILITY
The department will also be judged for their marching ability in parades and will receive awards for this annual competition.

Chairman of the firemen's committee of the carnival Herb Schurman who has done a tremendous organizational job, says he has rooms booked in motels, hotels and tourist homes for miles around and requests that anyone having room in private homes notify him.

However some of the firemen, many of whom are bringing their wives and families own trailers and tents and will have their own accommodation as long as they can find a spot to park.

Approximately 25 departments will be represented in this year's tournament and Mr. Schurman is going all out to make it the best ever.

Warning Issued Against Blight

The long period of wet weather has caused late blight to appear unusually early on the North Mountain of Nova Scotia, states the weekly potato-bulletin issued by the Research Laboratory in Charlottetown.

The potato growers in this area are therefore advised that fungicides should be applied at the earliest opportunity.

The overwintering brood of flea beetles is now present in almost all potato fields in both provinces. This brood will continue for at least another week. In fields where they are numerous and damage is becoming severe DDT sprays should be applied.

The bulletin is prepared by F. M. Cannon and L.C. Callbeck of the research laboratory.

Adult Education Aid Granted West Indies

Funds provided by the Federated Women's Institute of Canada will help educate adult illiterates in the new Federation of the West Indies.

During a session of the FWIC Board held yesterday at St. Dunstan's it was decided that the organization will adopt as a national project the UNESCO Gift Coupon Plan No. 400.

This is an adult education project connected with the extramural department The University College of the West Indies which serves all areas of the federation and also British Honduras and British Guiana.

FIMELY PROJECT
Advocates of the plan point out that this is a timely project in view of the recent organization of the rural women's groups in these countries, and the growing interest in trade between Canada and the Federation, our nearest Commonwealth neighbor.

The development of an adult education program at all levels and in all regions was seen as the cornerstone of the new Commonwealth nation.

At the F.W.I.C. board meeting which was held Tuesday at SDU, a discussion on Civil Defence showed that Provinces bordering on the ocean are more defence conscious than the ones inland.

It was recommended that more participation should be taken in this subject which is useful not only in time of conflict but in time of disaster. Several of the board members have attended the Civil Defence Colleges at Arnprior, Ontario.

Mrs. George Wilson, Chairman of publicity, St. Mary's, Ontario, presented her report and The F.W.I.C. endorsed a project to increase the subscription of their national publication, the Federated News, to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Women's Institutes. The campaign will be carried out under the slogan, "Every F.W.I.C. Member, a Federated News Subscriber."

The Federated News, editor Mrs. Laird, gives a resume of FWIC national and provincial work from west to east, and glimpses of the Associated Country Women of the World, a bond through which understanding and unity are fostered.
