## Fisheries Officials Aim For Improvement

Senior federal and provincial fisheries officials will meet in Montreal on Wednesday, April 27, to consider additional measures to improve the productivity of Atlantic coast inshore fishermen, Federal Minister of Fisheries H.J. Robichaud announced yesterday. One of the major steps necessary to increase the earning capacity of these fishermen is acceleration of construction and equipping of larger more productive fishing vessels, the Minister said.

In recent years construction of such vessels has been assisted through subsidies of 25 per cent or 30 per cent of cost, but in the face of rising construction costs and low income many inshore fishermen have been unable to take advantage of the assistance offered. The officials have been asked to reconsider the level of subsidy required as well as the development of more readily accessible credit facilities. The Minister indicated that for modern well-constructed vessels of the 35 to 45-foot class meeting standards

laid down by his Department and necessary for the implementation of federal-provincial development programs, the government is prepared to consider increasing the level of assistance to 50 per cent of cost. Details will be worked out at the Montreal meeting.

In the field of credit, the major source of financing has been through provincial loan agencies, the Minister said. In order to facilitate lending by such agencies the federal government is prepared to recommend such agencies as lenders under the Fisheries Improvement Loans Act. This action would provide a guarantee to provincial lending agencies similar to that now provided to banks and credit unions making loans to the Department of Finance will also be present at the meeting to discuss this aspect of the problem.

Dr. Hubert MacNeill, the PC member for Summerside is also expected to offer again and there is no indication he will be opposed.

CLAUDE IRES and ALFRED MACLENNAN are two names heard as possible nominees for the other side of the PC ticket in 5th Prince.

The 5th district was split in the last session of the Legislative Assembly with Liberal Leader Alex B. Campbell holding the other seat.

Have you registered yet? Remember, registration is essential if you are to obtain the benefits under the recently announced Dairy Support Program affecting fluid milk producers as well as cream and manufacturing milk shippers.

Full details and application forms can be obtained from the processor to whom you deliver your milk or cream.

If you have completed and forwarded your application, no further action is required on your part. You will receive your registration number shortly.

**NOTE ON PAYMENTS:** Federal Government Cheques will be paid monthly to producers of manufacturing milk as soon as your local plant reports the amount of your April shipment. Payments to cream shippers will be made on a quarterly basis. Payments to fluid milk producers will be made monthly—INITIALLY SOME WEEKS MAY BE REQUIRED TO COMPLETE REGISTRATION AND SET UP REPORTING PROCEDURES.
