Mud, plain Island mud, prevented official announcement of the election of Hon. J. Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarrie in last Monday's federal election.

Several ballot boxes, supposed to be sent back to the Queens County returning officer immediately after the election had not been received up until yesterday—declaration day.

However, A. Waitlen Gaudet, Queens County returning officer, managed to have all but one of the boxes brought into the city by use of a variety of transportation methods. But the one from the Envyville poll did not arrive up to last night.

Mr. Gaudet in a long series of telephone checks, learned the road on which the house of the deputy returning officer is located was practically a morass and impassable for most vehicles. However, he enlisted the help of an acquaintance in Kelly's Cross who arranged to dispatch a large tractor to get the box and take it to the paved road. There it was to be carried by hand to a plowed section where it was to be met by a car sent from this city by Mr. Gaudet.

Web Ewbank Named To Post

NEW YORK (AP) - Web Ewbank, coach of Baltimore Colts for nine years, was named Monday as head coach and general manager of the New York team in the American Football League.

At the same time, the team's nickname was changed from Titans to Jets.

The 55-year-old Ewbank, whose Colts won the National Football League championship in 1958 and 1959, was fired by the Baltimore club Jan. 9 and replaced by Don Stula. In Ewbank's regime, Baltimore won 59, lost 52 and tied one.

Ewbank signed a three-year contract at an undisclosed salary. He succeeds Bulldog Turner who replaced Sammy Baugh as coach of the Titans last fall.
