Tuesday Jan. 24.

The case of Lepage vs Doyle was concluded yesterday afternoon, when a verdict was rendered in favor of the plaintiff for \$69.25. Mr. A. A. MacLean, Q. C., was counsel for the plaintiff. Mr. W. S. Stewart Q. C. appeared for the defendant. To-day Edward Hughes, indicated for manslaughter is being tried.

The Chief Justice is trying the case, and the jury is made up as follows: J. Beecher Crosby, foreman; James Duffy, David Macdonald, Finlay McKeenzie, William Godfrey, Charles McCarthy, William Gillis, Daniel Macdonald, Patrick Corish, Augustus Doull, William Boyce and G. Crosby.

ENTERPRISING BOYS.—THE EXAMINER'S newboys have shown that, when properly encouraged, boys are capable of a marked degree of business enterprise. Last week, James Bradley, who has won in succession the different prizes given as premiums on sales of papers, secured as a prize a fine suit of clothes. He has, since the competition was opened last September, won a complete outfit, including a watch and chain.
