Young Tignish Veteran Passes

The death occurred at Hotel Dieu Hospital Moncton, N. B. on Wednesday July 19th of Joseph Gerald Tignish, 86, after an illness of four months.

Gerald was born in Tignish, P. E. I. and attained his early education at Tignish Convent and Dalton High School from where he matriculated. He became interested in cheesemaking and spent the summer months helping out at the local cheese factory, where at the age of 18, he was placed in charge as cheesemaker.

He volunteered for Active service with the Canadian army and joined the Signal Corps and saw action in France, Germany, Holland and other European countries. On his return from overseas he took up the dairy business again and entered Guelph Agricultural College, from where he received his diploma for Butter-making, Cheesemaking, and other lines of dairy activity. He made cheese in several Island factories and was recommended by the Dairy Superintendent of P. E. I. for the position which he held for the past two years with the General Dairies Moncton.

In Moncton he made many friends by his quiet and cheerful disposition. He was a member of the C. Y. O. and the Holy Name Society of St. Bernard's parish, and a corporal in the Reserve Army. He bore his sickness cheerfully and was never heard to complain of his affliction but was resigned to God's Holy Will. He received his Eucharistic Lord daily to be the food of his soul. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. J. W. Gavin, Tignish; five sisters, Mrs. George Bellefontaine, East Natick, Mass.; Mrs. Frank Rogers, Waltham, Mass.; Mrs. Peter Dunphy, Moncton, with whom he resided; Mrs. Alvin McKenna, Summerside, P. E. I. and Miss Priscilla Gavin, Tignish.

Also surviving are two brothers, Justin H. Gavin B. A., of Mount Saint Mary's Seminary Ohio, and Gregory Gavin B. Sc., of the General Dairies Moncton.

His remains were forwarded to his home in Tignish, where on Saturday, July 22nd the veterans of the community paid their respects to their departed comrade, six of them acting as pallbearers, viz, Walter Bernard, Wallace Reidy, Ivan O'Brien, William Profit, Alfred O'Brien, Paul Kinch.

The others paraded in a body and led the funeral procession to the church of St. Simon and St. Jude, where they formed a guard of honour as the casket was borne inside for the funeral service.

Solemn Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. J. A. MacDonald P. P. as celebrant assisted by Rev. L. B. Dooley curate, as Deacon, Rev. Claude Shea as sub-Deacon. Mr. Howard Shea served Thurifer while Annie Kinch and Joseph MacDonald served Acolytes. Mr. Justin Gavin was Master of Ceremonies.

Rev. L. B. Dooley conducted the service at the grave after which the Legion stood at attention while the casket, draped with the colors he so proudly served was lowered silently to its last resting place. The hush of that beautiful July morning seemed nature's final tribute to one who so nobly, quietly, and cheerfully served his home, his country and his God.

And as the strains of "The Last Post" broke the stillness its notes seemed to carry to heaven the silent prayers of the congregation who stood so reverently about that hallowed spot. May his soul rest in Peace.

Business Spotlight

Canadians continue their drive to build homes.

In July, says MacLean Building Reports, Ltd., residential contracts totalled \$74,200,000 or \$22,000,000 more than July a year ago. And they increased against a background of rising construction costs and postponement of some Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation projects.

The total for all Canadian construction contracts in July was \$151,039,800, up \$21,770,800 from July, 1949; and the cumulative figure for the first seven months of the year was \$737,123,400, or \$119,000,000 above the same period last year.

July commercial construction was \$41,622,800, up \$6,800,000; industrial \$7,008,100, up \$2,600,000; engineering \$28,219,100, down \$11,800,000.

Western Canada at \$23,745,400 was up \$1,100,000 from July, 1949; Ontario at \$66,396,300 was up \$12,879,000; Quebec at \$53,477,400 was up \$8,628,000; the Maritime region at \$7,420,700 was down \$840,000, despite inclusion of \$1,218,300 for Newfoundland which was not included last year.

The drop in engineering contracts reflected the fact that large contracts for Toronto's rapid transit system and for titanium development in Quebec were let in July last year. Road and street contracts in Ontario totalling \$12,000,000 helped sustain this July's figures.

Contracts included an orphanage and saw mill at Rimouski, Que., each totalling more than \$1,000,000; and a mental hospital at Port Arthur, Ont., \$1,500,000.

Will Consider Education Research

OTTAWA, Aug. 3—(CP)—Question of education research in Canada will occupy a "fairly large part" of the 29th conference of the Canadian Teachers Federation in Saskatoon this month.

George Croskey, C. T. F. secretary-treasurer, said today between 75 and 100 delegates from Provincial teachers organizations are expected to be on hand for the four-day meeting opening Aug. 14. Representatives of a dozen other national organizations also will attend.

Mr. Croskey said the teachers felt there should be greater co-ordination in education research studies now undertaken in this country. Speakers at the convention will include Dr. M. E. Lazerte of Edmonton, vice-president of the Canadian Education Association who will represent the C. E. A. at the convention.

Price of Chocolate Bars Advancing

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Aug. 4—(CP)—Increases in the prices of boxed chocolates in New Brunswick were reported today, with a possibility that chocolate bars will cost more soon. Two companies said that chocolates previously selling for 85 cents a box would cost \$1 while others were increased to \$1.50 from \$1.25 and \$1.35.

Higher costs of manufacturing were given as reasons for the boost. Five-cent bars may soon sell for seven or eight cents, according to rumors, and 10-cent bars may jump to 15 or 16 cents, including the provincial consumer tax.

HALIFAX, Aug. 4—(CP)—This is tough news for kids. A Halifax manufacturer (Morr's Ltd.) announced yesterday its chocolate bars will probably sell for seven cents each in the near future.

The company Tuesday announced price increases on its boxed chocolates ranging from 15 to 25 cents. An official said the chocolate bar price would be increased two cents "before the hot weather is over." Reason given for the boost was a 150 per cent. increase in the cost of cocoa beans.
