

Annual Meeting Geo'town Legion

The annual meeting of Georgetown Branch No. 15, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., was held in the Legion Hall on Monday, February 7, with Branch President, Comrade Marcellus Gotell presiding.

The meeting opened in the usual impressive manner. The Secretary, Comrade, D. A. MacCormick, read the minutes of the last monthly meeting, which were moved and adopted. Comrade Stephen Bachtelder was appointed as the second member of a committee of two; the first appointed was Comrade, Neil A. Wright. They will conduct the annual Boy Scout Financial Campaign.

Due to the absence of the Treasurer, there was no financial report presented. The Auditors reported that three accounts had been added to date. It was decided to defer the appointment of a new Treasurer to a later date, when the audit will be completed.

Oilcloth Co. Strike Ends

MONTREAL (CP)—A strike among 1,200 employees of the Dominion Oilcloth Company here ended Wednesday when the workers voted 97 per cent in favor of accepting a new labor contract. The strike began Nov. 16.

The vote came after union and company officials met Tuesday in Quebec City with Labor Minister Barrette.

In Farnham, where 134 employees of the subsidiary Barry and Staines, Ltd., were on strike, 96 per cent of the workers voted in favor of acceptance.

All agreed to return to work within six days.

The new contract provides increases of seven cents an hour for workers earning less than \$1.09 cents hourly. Workers earning a boost of nine cents an hour.

The increases apply to employees of both plants.
