

### Rural Life Conference Opens Thursday At S. D. U.

Mr. Waldo Walsh, Nova Scotia's Deputy Minister of Agriculture, will be the principal speaker at the third annual conference on rural life at St. Dunstan's University on August 8-9. Rev. William Simpson, Director of the University's Extension Department, has announced.

Participating in this year's conference will be 100 of the Province's rural leaders and several guests from Nova Scotia. The theme of the two-day meeting is "The Family Farm, Its Structure and Place in Island Economy."

"We are calling this conference a Country Caucus," Father Simpson explained, "because it will bring together a group of agricultural experts and rural leaders for the purpose of forming a policy and program for the family farms in this Province. Far from being a secret meeting, though, this caucus shall publish all its findings and recommendations."

The conference will open at 3 p.m. Thursday with a group discussion following a series of five-minute talks on "The Problem and its Challenge" by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, Allison Profit, Urban Laughlin, Mrs. Fred Gates and Rev. G. MacDonald will lead this symposium.

Mr. Walsh will speak at the dinner session that evening on "The Changing Pattern of Agriculture."

Later in the evening a panel under the chairmanship of J. Lincoln Dewar, Secretary of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture, will introduce a general discussion on "The Family Farm: Growth or Decline." Panel members will include Louis McGuire, Colin Waugh, Arnold Wood, Louis O'Connor and Peter Driscoll.

The morning of August 9 will be devoted to several concurrent workshops. Workshop leaders and their topics include: L. P. MacIsaac, Farm Credit; D.

A. MacDonald, Production and Land Use; Charles Yeo, Role and Responsibility of Government; J. Lincoln Dewar, Mechanization and Farm Income; Wilfred Driscoll, Rural Education; Audrey MacMillan and Teresa McLeod, Woman and the Land.

After lunch a group of rural leaders from Antigonish will tell of their "Search for a Solution." Among the speakers will be Rev. John Wayling, John Chisholm, Andrew Braid, and Des Connor.

This will be followed by a floor discussion of the reports from the various Workshops, at which Rev. T.R. Goudge will preside.

The closing session, containing a summary of the conference by W.R. Shaw, is expected to be present a reasonable "Blueprint for Agriculture."

The bag limit on the Huns has been reduced to five birds per day. It was eight previously. The bag limit on pheasants this season will be three birds per day. Only one of which may be a hen pheasant. This is a reduction from the five birds of either sex that were allowed last year.

### Covehead Church Honours Former Pastor - Anniversary

Fitting appreciation of a congregation to one of its beloved pastors was expressed at St. James United Church, Covehead on Sunday when a plaque of Swedish black granite was unveiled to mark 36 years of faithful ministry in the church by Rev. Thomas A. Wilson, B.Sc.

The unveiling took place in conjunction with the observance of the 150th anniversary of the Covehead Church.

The plaque to Rev. Mr. Wilson was unveiled by his son, Eric. A daughter of the veteran cleric, Miss Helen Wilson also participated in the service by the singing of a solo, "How Lovely Are Thy Dwelling's."

Rev. Mr. Wilson, now retired from the ministry, served the congregation of West Covehead from 1917 until 1953. He was present for the occasion Sunday and expressed his warm appreciation for the generous act of his former charge.

### Jordan, Syria Bury Hatchet

AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—Jordan and Syria, Jordan Arab neighbors, seemed to have buried the hatchet Monday after a weekend of military threats.

A statement issued after a meeting between Foreign Minister Samir Rifai and the Syrian charge d'affaires, Ahmed Rahbi, said the two countries shook hands in the hope "that a new page will be opened in brotherly relations... for the good of Arabs."

Pro-Soviet Syria announced Saturday it had received a threat of military attack from Jordan if the Syrian press did not stop a press campaign against King Hussein and his Hashemite kingdom.

The statement issued Monday said tensions arising from the press attacks had been removed.

But Syrian Foreign Minister Salah Bitar told a press conference in Damascus Monday the United States was behind what he called Jordan's "warlike ultimatum" Saturday.

He said U.S. Middle East policy was based on "sparring no effort to make the Arabs forget Israel's threat by means of creating inter-Arab disputes."

Jordan has denied issuing any ultimatum. She has said Syria was exaggerating a protest.

In the last three days, the two nations—pledged to defend each other in an Israeli attack—map occurred in an atmosphere of emergency.

### Predicts Early Federal Vote

TRAIL, B.C. (CP)—Public Works Minister Howard Green says a federal election will be called "before next July."

Mr. Green, MP for Vancouver Quadra, said Sunday he personally believes there would have been an election this fall had it not been for Queen Elizabeth's decision to visit Canada and open Parliament.

These circumstances delayed the opening until October, putting a snap election out of the question.

He said because of the weather, mid-November—the earliest possible date following an early October session—would not be a good time for an election.

### British Admiral Died Sunday

LONDON (Reuters)—Admiral Sir Arthur Lumley St. George Lyster, 69, who played a major part in three of the biggest naval operations of the Second World War as a commander of aircraft carriers, died Sunday.

He commanded the group of carriers from which the British fleet arm struck at the Italian fleet at Taranto in November, 1940.

Former prime minister Sir Winston Churchill said the operation affected "decisively the balance of naval power in the Mediterranean."

He also commanded the aircraft carriers which helped to get a large relief convoy through to the besieged island of Malta. His third great Mediterranean command was at the time of the North Africa landings, when his carrier aircraft covered the invading troops.

### Five Ships Stuck In Hudson Strait

MONTREAL (CP)—Five freighters on their way to load grain at Churchill, Man., have been stuck in heavy ice for the last three days in Hudson Strait, it was learned here Monday.

The Leersum, Heral, Athamas, Carl Julius, and Ferland are reported unable to move in icefields off Cape Hood advance.

However, another ship, the Nordmeer, arrived in Churchill July 31 and has since loaded and sailed. The British vessel Warkworth was scheduled to begin loading Monday.

A third vessel at Churchill, the Atreo, took such a pounding on her way from Britain that an expert flown in from Montreal was to survey her bottom to see if she can safely load.

Ships' masters report ice conditions on the steamer track into Hudson Bay are the worst in years for this season. They say drift ice especially makes navigation dangerous.

### Two Dead In Sudden Flood

LAS VEGAS, N.M. (AP)—A sudden flood roared out of the mountains north west here early Monday, taking two lives and breaking three small dams in its fury.

Rev. Emil LaPorte, 41, and his daughter, Laura, 10, were found drowned a mile downstream from where their car was washed off a road into a gully.

The bulk of the water from the mountain deluge swept down the Gallinas River, which flows through Las Vegas.

Las Vegas itself escaped flooding as river banks held through the city. Low areas to the north and south of the city were evacuated.

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### Canadian Jets Reach Germany

BADEN - BADEN, West Germany (Reuters)—The last of four squadrons of Canadian-built CF-100 twin-jet all-weather fighters to join Canada's NATO forces in Europe arrived here Monday, after completing the last leg of their flight, 1,600 miles from Keflavik, Iceland, in three hours and 20 minutes.

An RCAF spokesman said he could not disclose the total number of aircraft which had arrived. But he added that he had heard nothing further about one plane of the squadron which disappeared in the Seattle area of Quebec's north shore Thursday, first day of their flight from North Bay, Ont.

The squadron made two landings on the way—at Goose Bay, Labrador, and at Keflavik.
