COOLING MILK AND CREAM

With the approach of warmer weather greater care must be exercised in handling milk and cream on the farm. If milk is not cooled immediately after milking the bacteria count increases at a rapid rate. This is illustrated by the following figures:

These figures show that milk can be safely cooled and kept for 48 hours using cold, flowing water, provided the utensils are clean. Raw milk kept in this manner can be put on the market with a bacteria count below the required 50,000.

Water from a well is approximately 45°F. By allowing water at this temperature to circulate at the rate of 50 gallons per hour a ten gallon can of milk will cool down to nearly 50° in little more than an hour. If you do not have running water on your farm, change the water after the milk has been there for an hour.

Also, the milk should be sheltered from the sun. Cans sitting in the sun absorb a lot of heat and cooling in water is of little use. This also applies to milk en route to the factory. Vehicles used to haul milk or cream should be properly covered to protect the cans from the heat and dust.

Pasture For Hogs

Hog pasture can save up to 40 per cent of the concentrate feed used in dry lot feeding of hogs. With the high present-day cost of concentrate feed every farmer who raises hogs should plan to make the best possible use of his home grown feeds. Now is the time to plan on raising your hogs on pasture this summer. A clover or grass pasture would be good for June and part of July. Rape, planted soon as possible would be ideal from late July through the pasture season. For 20 pigs an acre of grass and two acres of rape should be sufficient. Keep in mind that pigs only have one stomach and so have a limited digestive capacity. For that reason they must be fed a concentrate feed in order to develop properly. Plenty of clean fresh water is also important. Hogs are quite easy to fence. A one strand electric fence, 2 strands of barbed wire, or a woven wire fence will hold them. Put a ring in the hog's nose to prevent deep rooting in the soil. Rape is best sown in drills, 28-30 feet apart, similar to turnips. The hogs then walk between the drills, and eat from the sides of the plants. Sow rape in clubroot free soil as it is very susceptible. Fertilizer at rate of 600-800 lbs. per acre should be applied for growing rape. Cultivation to keep down weeds between the drills should be practiced before hogs are put in the field. Sow about 3 lb. of seed per acre.

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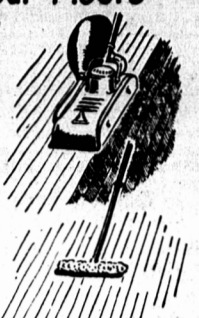
