EDWARD BAYFIELD, Esq., had in town, to-day, a sample of new potatoes. These, we venture to say, are "the earliest of the season."

PERSONALS.—A. Macnab, Superintendent of P. E. I. Railway, and Mrs. Macnab and three children were registered at the Halifax Hotel on the 7th inst.

BENNETT'S counsel, on the 5th, presented him with a petition for the commutation of his sentence. Bennett refused to sign the paper, saying he preferred death to imprisonment.

THE Canadian Wimbledon Team were victorious in a match which took place with the 15th Lancashire Volunteers, at Aitcar on the 6th inst.

WE notice by the Truro Sun that the Odd-fellows of Pugwash, N. S., purpose having an excursion to Charlottetown on Monday next, 12th inst., and intend returning in steamer "Heather Belle."

MR. SANDFORD FLEMING, the eminent engineer, is said to be on his way from Ottawa to take up his residence in Nova Scotia. It does not appear in what capacity or for what reason he is about to reside in the adjoining Province.

CHINAMEN COMING.—It is reported that fifty Chinamen are shortly coming to Woodstock, N. B., to work in the iron works. Thirty-five men are at present employed re-tilting the building.

THE steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from from Halifax on Thursday morning with a cargo of merchandize, and sailed late the same evening with a cargo of 1,200 bushels of oats and other produce.

A correspondent of the Patriot at Alberton, writes: "Fishermen still complain of cod as being scarce although improving in size. Mackerel are exceedingly plenty although wholly averse to taking the hook. Lobsters continue plentiful. The factories succeed in getting as many as they can handle."

SAILED from Port Hill, on Thursday, the 1st inst., Barquentine "Sunbeam," E. Haiseth, master, for Swansea, with a cargo of 11,275 bushels of oats, 39 tons of birch timber, 68,317 feet of deals, 400 feet of deal ends, and 1 cord of lathwood, shipped by Hon. John Yeo, Port Hill.

There is Death in the Lobster.

MR. FRED CURTIS and family, of this city, narrowly escaped being fatally poisoned by the use of preserved lobsters, which had undergone poisonous changes. It appears that on Thursday evening, Mr. Curtis, with two young daughters and servant girl, at tea, partook of some lobster that had been opened three days previously, and which other members of the family (three or four in number) did not partake of. The lobster, being a little stale, was saturated with vinegar, which prevented the detection of its poisonous contents. About three hours later, Mr. Curtis, who was on the street, became suddenly ill—attacked by violent retching and pains. On going to his residence, two of his children and a servant girl were found to be similarly affected. Medical aid was immediately summoned and the proper assistance rendered; but the sufferers were not pronounced out of danger until three o'clock on Friday morning.

This almost fatal accident was caused by the use of canned meats which had undergone putrefactive and poisonous changes from exposure to atmospheric influences. These canned meats being hermetically sealed, are for use immediately on opening; and are apt to cause great distress to the user when left open for five or six hours, particularly at the present season of the year.

That the putrefactive change was the sole cause of the poisoning is proven from the fact that meat from the same can was eaten by the same persons on Tuesday evening last, without any ill effects whatever. The case should serve as a salutary warning to the community at large, showing as it does, that these fresh and unseasoned meats may—while a luxury, if used immediately on opening—be rank poison after exposure to heat and air for a few days.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

TORONTO, July 7.

The Globe this morning contains the following, dated London, July 6th:—"In the match that took place last night at Aitcar, between the Canadian team and the 15th Lancashire Volunteers, the Canadians were victorious by 26 points, the score standing 1,422 for the Canadians and 1,356 for the Lancashires. Wilson, Ogg and O'Grady made the highest scores. The weather was fair and the wind strong. Good practice was also made with the Martini-Henry rifle."

DUBLIN, July 7.

The weather over Ireland has been most favorable. It is expected the potato crop will be enormous, and promises to exceed anything in Ireland since a period anterior to the famine of 1847. The root and cereal crops are also luxuriant.

PARIS, July 7.

An attempt is making by the enemies of the Republic to get the Communists to meet at the cemetery of Pere La Chaise on the 14th July, but it is believed the Senate is alarmed at the situation and disposed to yield.

PERA, July 7.

Several Turkish ironclads, under command of Hobart Pasha, will start for the Adriatic immediately to watch the coast.

BERLIN, July 7.

The murderer of Prince Kraptokin is believed to have disclosed the names of all the principal Nihilists to the Russian Government, which thus has been able to arrest all the ring-leaders. It is reported that the United States is negotiating with the Porte regarding the safety of American missionaries in Turkey should trouble ensue.

ROME, July 7.

It is said that the Pope will not accept the resignation of Cardinal Mina, Papal Secretary of State.

NEW YORK, July 8.

Police Inspector Byrnes, to-night arrested Lawrence R. Jerome, jr., son of the well known banker and sporting man, and Edward M. Patchell, manager of the banking house of Bevan & Co., on a grave charge. A messenger boy in the employ of Brayton, Ives & Co., was sent out, last Saturday, to deliver stocks valued at \$87,200. He returned saying that he had lost the package on Wall street. Mr. Ives, who is president of the Stock Exchange, reported his case to the police. After a long search the securities were traced to the possession of the prisoners. Both are unmarried young men and familiar with the ways of Wall street, Jerome being engaged in the stock business. After their arrest, the stocks were found in Patchell's office, and it was admitted by the young men that they knew to whom the securities belonged. They intended sending them to Europe and having them negotiated there. The manner of obtaining possession of stocks was not divulged.

VICKSBURG, Miss., July 7.

The Republican convention, to-day, nominated John R. Lynch (colored) of Adams County, on the 53rd ballot, for Congress, from sixty Mississippi districts.

EASTPORT, ME., July 7.

On Sunday, while the brig Daisy Boynton was on the way from St. John to Eastport, one of the crew refused duty. The Captain reported to the cutter McCullough and the man was taken off and lodged in the station house here. Four others of the crew refused duty, but submitted after the officer from the cutter boarded the brig.

NEW YORK, July 7.

Fifty eight children died here yesterday from heat and summer disease. The new board of fifty sanitary inspectors have already visited several thousand poor families and over a thousand sick children have been attended to.
