Safe Driving League Will Be Formed Here

The Provincial Safety Council plans to form a safe driving league in Prince Edward Island in an effort to further its campaign of highway safety. Council chairman George Meikle said Wednesday members of the league will be identified by a sign on their vehicle's bumper or license plate. He said league members will promote safety through the reporting to the council of any infractions they see of the Highway Traffic Act. Persons seen contravening the act, said Mr. Meikle, will be notified of the infraction by letter and asked to be more careful in future in the interests of highway safety. "The dangers of careless driving will be emphasized in the letter," said Mr. Meikle. Persons may become members of the safe driving league through application, said Mr. Meikle, and applicants must have excellent driving records, not having lost any points through traffic infractions and not having had any accidents within a three-year period. "It is hoped," said Mr. Meikle, "that the league will be a deterrent to careless driving, as well as reporting traffic infractions of other drivers to the council." Meanwhile, the council will run a series of advertisements, beginning Saturday in The Guardian, aimed at making motorists more familiar with "the commonly unrealized infractions of the Highway Traffic Act." Mr. Meikle said that many motorists do not realize when some infractions of the act occur. "For this reason," he said, "the safety council will run a series of ads showing the common infractions over which motorists could lose demerit points." The infractions—42 of them—were prepared from the Highway Traffic Act by the RCMP. Mr. Meikle said the advertising program is "all part of the Provincial Safety Council's program to cut down on traffic accidents and traffic deaths."

City Catholic Churches Holy Services Listed

The three Roman Catholic churches in the Charlottetown area announced special Holy Week services yesterday morning. At St. Dunstan's Basilica His Excellency Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown, will celebrate Holy Mass at 9 o'clock this Holy morning. At this service, Bishop MacEachern will bless the Holy Oils which will be used in the sacraments of Extreme Unction, Confirmation, Holy Orders and Baptism. Other masses today at the Basilica will be at 5.15 and 7 p.m. This latter Mass will be the Mass of the Last Supper. At the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer Masses today (Thursday) will be at 4 p.m., 5.45 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. At this evening Mass a procession of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be held. The stripping of the altar will follow the Mass and the Blessed Sacrament will remain exposed for public adoration until midnight. At St. Pius X in Parkdale Masses are at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. The same ceremony will follow the 7 o'clock service as at Holy Redeemer, and adoration will continue till midnight.

ON GOOD FRIDAY. Solemn liturgical service will be held at 3 o'clock Good Friday at all Catholic churches. At the Basilica and St. Pius X, Way of the Cross devotion will be held at 7 o'clock in the evening. His Canadian Legion home, Charlottetown, April 22. Gordon MacDonald, director of Adult Sheltered Workshop of CARC at Charlottetown along with Mrs. MacDonald, will attend the May 6 meeting, to enlighten the members on the work that is being accomplished there. Films will be shown. The O'Leary and Alberton members will be invited to attend. Rev. Clare MacDonald spoke on the religious training of the children.

Excelsy Bishop MacEachern will conduct this evening service at the Basilica. There will be no service at Holy Redeemer Friday other than the solemn liturgical service at 3 o'clock. No Masses will be celebrated on Easter Saturday. However, all three churches will hold the Easter Vigil service. At St. Pius X the service will commence at 10.40 p.m., at St. Dunstan's Basilica 10.45 and at the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer at 11 o'clock. At these services the Easter Fire and Water will be blessed as well as the Pascal Candle. At Holy Redeemer two adults will receive the sacrament of Baptism at this service. Following these Easter Vigil services, Midnight Mass will be celebrated and special music will be rendered by the choirs. At the Basilica and Holy Redeemer the Mass of the Good Shepherd (Rev. S. Somerville) will be sung. Choir directors at the Basilica will be Rev. E. Vandeven and Frank MacIntyre. Organist will be Albert Blanchard. Choir directors and organists at Holy Redeemer will be Jack Blanchard and Elmer Power, and Eugene Gorman and Wilbert MacInnis.

Masses on Easter Sunday are as follows: St. Dunstan's Basilica 7, 8, 9.30 (Pontifical High), 11 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon at Holy Redeemer 7.30, 8.30, 10, 11.30, and 5.30 p.m.; at St. Pius X 7.15, 8.30, 10.30 and 5 p.m. At the Good Friday service in all three churches, Holy Communion will be distributed and adoration of the Cross will take place.

Late Germination Tests Annoy Agriculture Men

Delayed by federal authorities in reporting results of grain germination tests to Island Growers have caused officials of the federation of agriculture to express annoyance.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday the federal testing station at Sackville, N.B., has been closed out and germination tests are now carried out at a federal station in Ottawa.

"When the Sackville station was in operation," Mr. MacRae said, "results of tests were available to growers within a week or 10 days. Now test results are as late as a month in being received."

"Growers can't sell their seed grains until they know what grade their grain is and this is determined by the germination tests."

Mr. MacRae said his deputy minister, S.C. Wright, is now in Ottawa and will be taking the matter up with federal agricultural authorities.

Mr. Wright is attending a meeting of provincial deputies of agriculture. On other agricultural matters, Mr. MacRae met yesterday with Walter Packman, a representative of H.G. Acres, the consulting firm that is preparing a development plan from the three economic surveys carried out in the province during the past two years.

Mr. Packman has also been a consultant for the federal agricultural rehabilitation and development program and Mr. MacRae discussed with him the implications of the new federal provincial ARDA agreement signed last week by Mr. MacRae.

Kinkora Man Dies In Mass.

Word has been received by Fred Ramahan, Borden, of the death of his brother Albert at Reading, Mass., in his 58th year. He had been failing for some months but his death came suddenly. Albert was born at Kinkora and attended school there but had spent most of his years in the U.S.A. Last summer he spent a week in Borden with his brother Fred and visited friends and relatives in Kinkora and vicinity. His remains will arrive at the Monaghan Funeral Home on Thursday, April 15, and funeral will be held on Friday morning at St. Malachi Church, Kinkora. Burial will be in the church cemetery there.

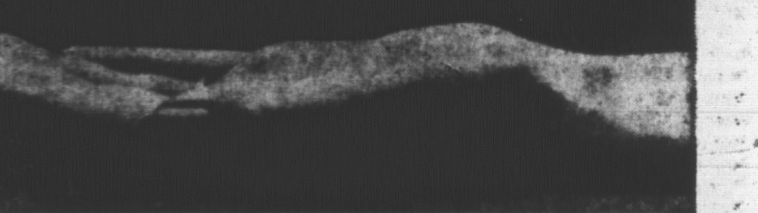
