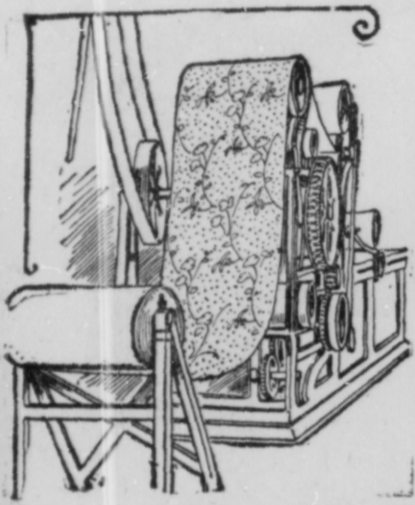

ANOTHER GIFT FOR MCGILL

Given to the School of Mining

The Donation Said to be About \$300,000.

MONTREAL, March 25.—Sir William McDonald has made another munificent donation to McGill University.

This time it is the school of mining which benefits; and the gift is large enough to provide the services of a lecturer, a demonstrator, assistant and a complete staff of mechanics, which, with the recent endowment of a professor's chair gives that department a complete staff.

The amount of Sir William's donation has not yet been made public, but it is said to be in the neighborhood of \$300,000, and raises the total sum of money he has given to McGill to over \$3,600,000.

The Fighting at Manila.

MANILA, March 28.—Genl. McArthur's division advanced nearly two miles without encountering opposition this morning.

On approaching Bulacan, a town of 25,000 people he made preparations to attack it.

McArthur and his army are resting on the plain beyond Manila after three days scrambling in the bush, fording rivers and charging trenches in the blazing sun. The men are tired, but are in splendid spirits.

A New Militia Order.

OTTAWA, March 29.—In Militia Orders, General Hutton publishes the following: "The general officer commanding desires it shall be clearly understood by all concerned that all officers appointed temporarily or otherwise to command military districts are for the time being, and in their military capacity as such representing himself. The general officer commanding holds himself responsible for all their military actions, for which they are accountable to him."

The Saturday Review, discusses the future relationship between the United States and Great Britain in a long article entitled "The Rivals." After pointing out that "nothing material has yet been the outcome of the passing wave of sentimental hypnosis," it proceeds to blame the American trusts for the failure of the British-American-Canadian Commission, saying: "Those trusts may be expected to menace British supremacy with the same unscrupulous rivalry in the far East as is now shown in Canada, and ultimately everywhere in the world, and as the trusts control American politics such immediate advantages as England might gain from an alliance would be largely overshadowed by the dangers into which the trusts are likely to force America by insisting upon an indefinite policy of expansion." The article concludes by advising England to pursue her own way, "treating America with the same courtesy which she extends to Continental nations, no less and no more."

Two Editors Go to Gaol.

BERLIN, March 27.—The German Government wishes its little Dreyfus case handled with gloves, or, preferably, not at all. Gustav Landauer, a Berlin editor, who declared recently that Police Commissioner Gottschalk, formerly of Eberfeld, had manufactured evidence to secure the conviction of Albert Zethen for murder, has just been sentenced to six months' imprisonment, while Herr Zapf, another editor, gets a two months' term.

Zethen is the Elberfeld editor, who, in 1883, was sentenced to the imprisonment on the charge that he had killed an aged and wealthy couple named Nefes.

Surplus in Italy

LONDON, Saturday, March 27.—The Rome correspondent of the Morning Post says:—"It is believed the Italian Budget will show a surplus, instead of the anticipated deficit, owing to the tobacco monopoly yielding an extra profit of 6,000,000 lire, and to the fact that other taxes have proved considerably better than the estimates."

An Improvement in Spain.

LONDON, Saturday, March 27.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says:—"Senor Sileveia, the Premier, has informed the Queen Regent that her ratification of the peace treaty, by accelerating the payment of the \$50,000,000 promised by the Americans, has improved the commercial outlook abroad, and that there is nothing whatever to fear from the Carlists."
