

BED BUG POISON.—Of all mixtures for killing these vermin, half an ounce of corrosive sublimate in a pint of alcohol is the surest. Have a bottle well labeled and handled carefully, for it is a very strong poison. Apply with a small brush (kept for that purpose only) to the unvarnished parts of the bedsteads. If there is reason to suppose the bedstead is unsafe, spread an old sheet on the floor under it, so that if any drop they can be seen. Poison the bedstead before you dust it or take it apart; then take it apart gently and poison the tenons, etc., and let dry in. This kills all the bugs and their eggs without scattering them through the room; afterwards dust, scrub clean, and poison again. Bedsteads should be carefully examined very often, for bugs multiply fearfully and can make you an immense amount of labor and trouble.

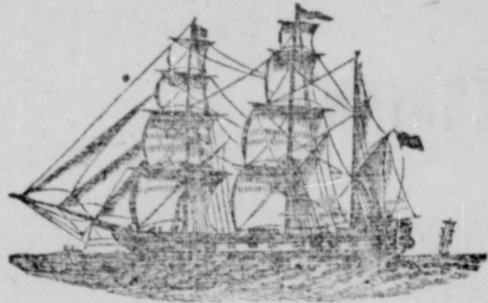

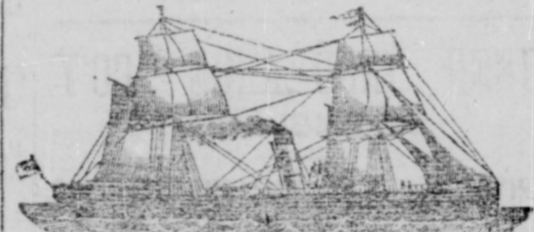

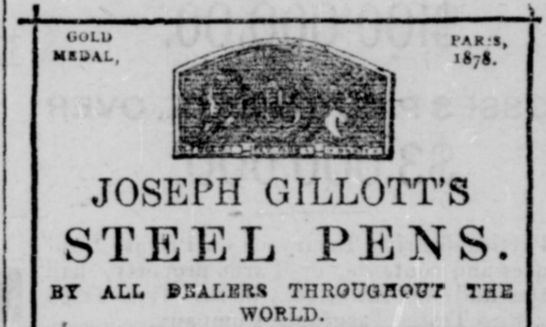
