NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Mr. Martin Again Pleads the Cause of P. E. Island.

SIR RICHARD HAS THE FLOOR.

Sir Charles Will Criticise the Government Re the Spoils System.

OTTAWA, May 11.—Yesterday was private members' day.

Mr. McMullen withdrew his bill to make the civil service non-partisan. At 10 o'clock Mr. Martin, of P. E. Island, resumed the debate adjourned some days ago, concerning the financial relations of the Province to the Dominion. He spoke at some length, supporting the proposition that Prince Edward Island had not received justice. When he closed, Sir Richard Cartwright adjourned the debate and the House.

Sir Charles Tupper has given notice of a motion for a return of all dismissals made since the new Government took office.

THE JUBILEE PROCESSION.

Canada Will Take the Lead.

LONDON, May 11.—The first portion of the Jubilee procession in London on June 22nd will consist of the colonial premiers and escorts. Canada will take the lead.

GREECE BROUGHT TO REASON

Requests Mediation of Powers.

ATHENS, May 11.—It is stated that the Government has drafted a note to the Powers and requested mediation.

Quebec Election Predictions.

MONTREAL, May 11.—Hon. J. I. Tarte expressed himself yesterday as being of the opinion that Premier Flynn would have a majority of six in the election. Today Raoul Dandurand, the Liberal organizer, places the Liberal majority at twenty-five. The Conservatives claim that they will have a majority of fifteen.

Sudden Death at Moncton.

MONCTON, May 11.—Mr. George Hogan, while on his way to attend a prayer meeting last evening, dropped dead on the road. The deceased was well and favorably known all over the city, having been a civil engineer at one time, but of late years connected with the engineer's office here.

A Political Supporter.

MONCTON, May 11.—Mr. A. E. Killam, M. P. P., has been appointed inspector of bridges on the Intercolonial Railway. This is a new office established at a salary said to be \$1,800 a year.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, May 9.—The Daily Mail, which celebrated its birthday this week, has been the greatest success known in English journalism. It is now selling about 320,000 copies daily. Its building is the largest newspaper building in London, and all its proprietors are under 33 years of age.

MADRID, May 9.—The queen regent has issued a decree authorizing the raising of £8,000,000, to be secured by the customs duties of Spain, to meet the cost of military operations in Cuba and the Philippine Islands. The Bank of Spain will undertake the issue.

LONDON, May 9.—The correspondent of the Standard at Constantinople says: "I learn that a circular has been addressed by the Sheikul-Islam to the Muslims in Constantinople and the provinces, which fore-shadows the speedy approach of a holy war, the sacred edict for proclaiming which is already being prepared."

OMAHA Neb., May 9.—A special to the Bee from Auburn, Neb., says: The mayor and city council are in jail and are likely to remain there. Judge Stull had them cited to appear for contempt, and sent them to jail for disregarding orders. The trouble originated in an effort to open a street.

PARIS, May 9.—The ring and stables of the circus Molier were burned tonight, a fireman and policeman being seriously injured. M. Casimir Perier was to have presided at the opening of a charity fete in the circus today, but the function was postponed in consequence of the terrible calamity at the charity bazaar last Tuesday.

LONDON, May 9.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Copenhagen says: "The secret struggle at the Russian court continues. Count Muravieff, the foreign minister, who has absolute influence over the Czar, resists the influence of the Dowager Empress and wishes to see the Danish dynasty in Greece dethroned and expelled. Count Muravieff has succeeded in persuading the Czar to postpone his tour."

PARIS, May 9.—An anonymous donor has sent the sum of £37,500 to the committee of management of the charity bazaar in the Rue Jean Conjon, which was the scene of last week's terrible tragedy from fire. This amount, with the proceeds of the first day's sale £1,800, equals the full receipts of the bazaar of 1896, and the committee is thus enabled to make distributions as before.

LONDON, May 9.—The special features of last week's market have been the abundance of money and the indications that rates will continue easy. For the moment business is confined for the most part to professional operators. The generally favorable news from the Transvaal has caused a rise in African mining stocks during the last few days. Home railways the best investment securities, have advanced during the last week. Greeks, Turks and Italians are all firmer, though Brazilian have fallen two points on the decline of exchange. Canadians have improved. Americans are neglected, as it is feared the new tariff will seriously upset business.

MONTREAL, May 9.—The store of E. A. Small & Co., wholesale clothing, was damaged by fire last evening to the extent of \$200,000.

NEW YORK, May 9.—The big new dry dock in the Brooklyn navy yard sprung a leak yesterday afternoon. The battle ship Massachusetts is lying in the dock. The entire force of the naval construction was called out and worked all night to repair the damage, the extent of which has not been ascertained.
