Racing Season Drawing Near

The Prince Edward Island Auto Racing Association and Go-Kart Club will be swinging into action soon and all indications are that the local auto-club will have another banner season.

Racing will be held at the Covehead Kart Park each Saturday night beginning about the first of June and the greater portion of the events staged at the Covehead Park will be held under the lights.

Officials of the local club have informed us that there will be some variety added to the program this season; in the way of racing displays by automobiles and drag racers.

The Go-Karts and their drivers started racing back in 1958 on the north side asphalt raceway and each year the number of race fans travelling to the Covehead raceway to enjoy the fun and noise of the little monsters has been on the increase and the sport is flourishing little by little.

To date, Go-Kart racing has been Prince Edward Island's only motorsport racing event, and the tourist has proven to be one of the biggest customers at the Covehead Kart Park. That the sport is a tourist attraction is beyond a doubt and many visitors are seen to return each year.

Two classes of racing will again be held at the north-side raceway this season in order to give the slow and fast driver an opportunity to compete at the speed they wish. Main events and the new endurance type race will be staged from time to time and officials of the Island club have plans for new and exciting events.

A special invitational meet will be held at Covehead early in July, with visiting karters from around the Maritimes competing. The first lap of the Maritime Championships will take place in Halifax, N.S. early in August and the big Labor Day meet will be held at the Prince Edward Island raceway.

Sandy's Royals defeated Shearwater Flyers 4-6 at the Charlottetown Forum Monday night to nail down the Maritime Intermediate "A" hockey championship in straight games. The Charlottetown team defeated Shearwater 9-4 on home ice Saturday night and last night's decision clinched the title for the Angus "Angie" Carroll coached forces.

Bill Hartack, who has ridden four Kentucky Derby winners, will ride the Wheatley stable's Bold Lad in the May 1 Derby at Louisville. Trainer Bill Winfrey said Tuesday he completed arrangements Monday night by phone with Hartack, who is riding at Gulfstream Park in Florida. Boston Red Sox Head The Field

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Felix Mantilla hit the first grand slam home run of his career and drove in all the Boston runs Tuesday as the surprising Red Sox took undisputed possession of the American League lead with a 5-2 victory over Washington.

Dave Morehead, making his first start of the year, struck out 11 before he gave way to relief man Dick Radatz in the eighth inning. Morehead struck out the side in the third and seventh, although he yielded a homer to Bob Chance and a single by Don Lock in the seventh.

Mantilla's homer, his second of the season, came on a 3-1 pitch by Washington starter Buster Narum in the first. Narum walked two men and allowed a scratch single by Tony Conigliaro before Mantilla homered.

Roberto Clemente drove in two runs with a pair of singles Tuesday, spoiling the home opener of the San Francisco Giants and giving Pittsburgh a 13-1 victory.

The National League's 1964 batting champion, who suffered malaria during the winter and missed much of spring training, drove in his runs in the first and fifth innings. Those runs, plus Al McBean's relief pitching provided right - hander Bob Friend with his second victory of the year, both over the Giants.

A crowd of 37,784 saw Willie Mays record his third homer of the campaign, a 420-foot belt

Montreal Blanks Chicago Take Commanding Lead

By BILL NEVILLE MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens used two power play goals and a solid checking effort to blank Chicago Black Hawks 2-0 Tuesday night and move two games in front in their Stanley Cup hockey final. A forum crowd of 14,438 saw Canadiens completely outplay the disorganized and injury-weakened Hawks to head toward the third game of the best-of-seven final Thursday night in Chicago with a well-deserved 2-0 lead.

Goals by Jean Beliveau in the second period, and Dickie Duff in the third, both while Chicago was playing a man short, provided the margin of victory.

They raised to 14 the number of power play goals Canadiens have scored since the playoffs began. They got 11 in a six-game semi-final against Toronto Maple Leafs and one in Saturday night's 3-2 win in the opening game of this series.

At the other end of the rink Lorne (Gump) Worsley recorded

his first playoff shutout by handling 18 shots. It was one of the easiest whiewashes the ex-New York Ranger ever had as Canadiens, dogging their checks every step, gave the Hawks' few real scoring opportunities.

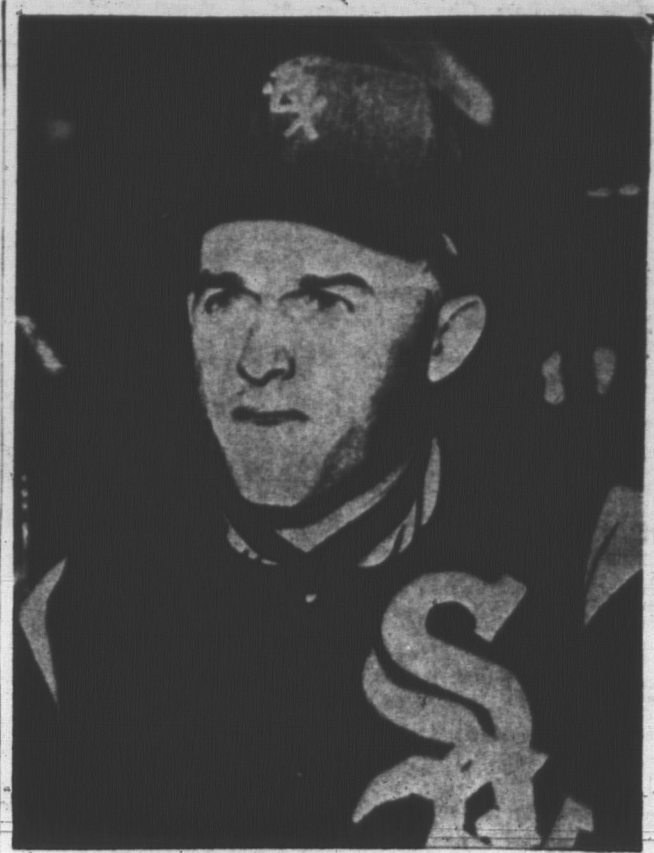
