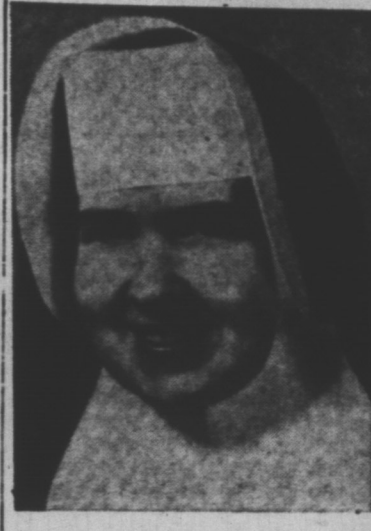
The sum of \$25,000 was voted for running expenses, the amount for the teacher's supplements having been voted at a previous meeting.

TIGNISH—A former Tignish resident, Bernard Neiligan, aged 21, was drowned Sunday afternoon at Belleville, Ont. Word of the tragedy was received Monday by his mother, Mrs. Cecil McCarthy of Sea Cow Pond and other relatives in the Tignish area.

The deceased is a son of Mrs. McCarthy by a previous marriage to the late John Neiligan. Mr. Neiligan had motored to Belleville from Toronto in company with two sisters and his fiancée Miss Norma Gallant of Tignish. Shortly after the group had gone swimming Mr. Neiligan took a cramp and others in the group were unable to rescue him.

### Young Ravens Are Captured By Cape Wolfe Fisherman

Lloyd Cook, a fisherman of Cape Wolfe, captured two young ravens, which are now in his possession. Mr. Cook was aware of the ravens nest in the vicinity and he decided to search for it. After some hunting around he located the nest on top of a 40-foot tree.

Cutting down the tree at what he figured was a suitable time he found four young ravens in the nest, each about the size of a crow. The nest was approximately the size of a wash tub. The two birds taken by Mr. Cook are the first ravens known to be captured in this area.

(Continued from page 1) whether Mr. Dorion had any personal knowledge of the alleged CBC letter to producers "or is he merely repeating gossip?"

Mr. Dorion said he received "serious information" from a person in a position to provide information.

The charge of "immoral" dramas on the CBC French TV network was made by Louis Fortin (PC—Montmagny—l'Islet). He said the dramas are "habitually immoral." Half the time viewers were shown family dramas involving broken homes. The CBC sever showed happy families living normal lives.

Mr. Fortin said one drama, "Deux Tours d'Horloge," shown two weeks ago, was basically im-

moral and raised serious doubts about the police forces in Canada.

Mr. Bushnell replied that if Mr. Fortin's statements were true, there would have been a great public outcry.

Mr. Picheraguil asked whether the CBC has received any considerable number of protests from the Roman Catholic episcopate about immorality of CBC programs.

Marcel Quimet, CBC deputy controller of broadcasting, said some individual bishops may have written to criticize individual programs in the past. The recent action by the Canadian Catholic Conference—representing all Roman Catholic bishops—criticizing the TV program on the life of Mother Marguerite d'Youville was "quite unprecedented."
