whereby the fleet of whale-back vessels on
the lakes can be turned into fighting ma-

feature is that that they can
be submerged so that only one foot of the
upper works appears above water. Marine
men and government officials agree that
with the addition of turrets to the whale-
back and a ram for war the vessels would
be of great service in case of war. There

PARIS, March 12.—The Temps says it
thinks the reports in the American news-
papers of the interview of the British
ambassador, Sir Julian Pauncefote, with
President McKinley "were intended to
sound the feelings of England, to which
country the Americans are now making
advances which strangely contrast with
their previous haughty attitude towards
their British cousins."

MONTREAL, March 12.—The Star's Lon-
don cable says: Petersen, when asked
today respecting the statement that his
firm had placed with Hawthorne, Leslie &
Co., Newcastle on Tyne, an order for two
of the four new steamers required for the
fast Atlantic services, replied that the
statement was premature, though practi-
cally true. The definite announcement
will not be possible until next week.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The United
States government has not yet acquired a
single additional ship for the navy. The
navy department is proceeding with all
circumspection in looking after the quali-
ties and prices of warships offered for sale.
There is a strong disposition to refrain
from being drawn into bad bargains and to
insist on getting good vessels at prices not
extortionate, Secretary Long received a
large number of cablegrams today, almost
all relating to offers of ships. Lieutenant
Niblack, the U. S. naval attaché at Ber-
lin, St. Petersburg and Vienna, is particu-
larly active in the quest for vessels. There
was a good deal of talk during the day
about the assignment of officers to the
command of auxiliary cruisers, the St.
Paul and St. Louis being especially men-
tioned, but Secretary Long stated that he
had not made any such assignment and
had only progressed to the point of in-
forming himself of the possibility of getting
the ships officered and manned quickly.

WHEN CANADA WAS HALVED.

Canada was at one time about twice as
large as it is now. In 1772-3 when Great
Britain was negotiating a peace with the
revolting American Colonies, she was re-
presented by a Mr. Oswald, who appears to
have been very generous. He agreed un-
necessarily to give up all of what is now
Ontario, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois
and Wisconsin. He was a most generous
man and would have given up the
whole of it if he had been asked. In
later negotiations through the efforts of
another gentleman named Strachey, ar-
rangements were made to keep Ontario,
but the British were bluffed out of a territory
which now contains more people than the

—Montreal Witness: While all the
world is in a state of ferment, and rumors
of war come from every quarter, the news
from Ireland represents that country as
enjoying an unprecedented state of progress
and prosperity. This is all the more re-
markable and gratifying from the fact
that this year is the centennial anni-
versary of the rebellion of 1798. That this
happy condition is likely to continue
is made reasonably certain by the almost
unanimous approval given by the Irish
representatives in the Imperial Parliament
to Mr. Balfour's bill for extending to Ire-
land a system of local government neces-
sarily differing somewhat from that exist-
ing in England, but quite as liberal and
as broadly based upon the will of the
people, who are given full control of all
municipal bodies and institutions. The
history of Ireland for the past century has
not been happy, but it is cheering to know
that its close gives promise of a brighter
future. The best sign of the times is to
be seen in the absence of agitation and the
attention the people are giving to the arts
of thrift and industry.

—Montreal Witness: A great amount of
gold is expected to come out of Yukon,
but at present the amount going in there
must be enormous. If a hundred thousand
men go there this season, that number
will mean at least fifty million dollars.
What a lot of hard work will be required
to take that value in gold out of the
frozen earth! It is the deliberate
calculation of those who know the
African gold fields that more gold has gone
into them than has ever come out. In that
case, as in Australia and California, gold,
while it has done little for its devotees, has
given a contingent to the world. The
best service the Klondike can render to
mankind will be the opening up of the
Peace river and other vast agricultural re-
gions to the populations they are so well
able to support.

Montreal Gazette: Russian diplomacy
and disregard of all interests but her own
seem to have secured her possession of
Port Arthur, the strongly fortified Korean
port which in the late war so easily fell
into the hands of the Japs. It will, no
doubt, be made a terminus for the much
talked of Siberian railway, and will greatly
strengthen Russia's power on the Pacific.
Russia's share of the Chinese Empire is
evidently destined to be a large one. She
acts on that good old rule and simple plan,
that they shall take who have the power,
and they shall keep who can; and China
does not seem able to keep.
