BANDS, FLOATS AND PRETTY GIRLS

Carnival Will Feature Mammoth Parade Today

SUMMERSIDE — The gaiety of the first day of the Summerside Lobster Carnival was evident among all of the 2,500 persons attending the evening program and official opening. The ceremony followed the serving of 700 lobster suppers.

Highlight of the evening show was the first appearance of 32 lovely Sea Queen contestants at the preliminary judging by three visitors to this province who were invited to act as judges. Miss Margaret Meyer, home economist with the Department of Fisheries in Ottawa; Cmdr. E. Petley-Jones, Commanding Officer of H.M.C.S. "Cayuga"; and Professor Gordon Watson, of the University of Toronto. The girls looked lovely in formal evening dress as they appeared twice before the judges and public, first to be introduced

individually, and again for a brief interview with commentator Robert Schurman.

IN PARADE
These contestants will appear again this afternoon on a large float in the big parade commencing at 3 p.m. and expected to contain about 70 units including floats, bands, and groups.

Another highlight of last evening's performance at the Stadium was the initial appearances of the St. Leon Troupe whose split second-timing resulted in a most pleasing and entertaining presentation.

A band concert by the Black Watch Band, in full Highland dress, was also a feature attraction of the evening show, preceding the official opening of the carnival.

Today the big parade of floats and bands will commence from

the Marine Wharf along a flag-decked route to Civic Stadium where lobster suppers will again be served from 4 to 8 p.m.

The selection of a new Sea Queen and Princesses will commence at 8 p.m. at the Stadium.

FIRE FIGHTING
The Summerside RCAF fire fighting department will present a demonstration of fire fighting at Queen Elizabeth Park in early evening.

The St. Leon Troupe will be seen again in two evening shows at the Stadium, and dancing will take the form of a street dance at the intersections of Notre Dame and Water Street West in front of the service station operated by Bob Banks.

Earlier in the evening a band concert will be presented in the Stadium by the Maritime Salvation Army Band.

Lobster Festival Opened In Stadium Ceremony

SUMMERSIDE — Member of Parliament for Prince Dr. Orville

H. Phillips officially opened the fourth annual Summerside Lobster Carnival at Civic Stadium last night.

A large number of distinguished guests were on stage and hundreds of patrons at the opening day's show which got underway in hot, humid weather with a promise of being the biggest and best carnival in its four year existence.

Late Blight Has Appeared

Weekly Potato Bulletin No. 3 on Monday, July 13, a few plants infected with potato late blight were found in a cull pile at Augustine Cove, Prince Edward Island. This should be sufficient warning to all growers who have not yet started their spray program that the time to do so has arrived, advises.

In this province, the first report of an infected field usually comes within five days after the disease has been discovered in cull piles. The weather during the past several days suggests that the same story will be repeated this year. It is anticipated that, if the present moist conditions continue, field infections will be announced in the next bulletin.

Flea beetles are quite numerous in many potato fields but this brood will disappear later this week. If insecticides have not already been applied to control flea beetles it would not warrant the expense and labour of putting them on at the present time.

Last evening, in the first round, the Navy defeated the Summerside Legion, sponsors of the competition, after which Ellerslie won their second pull defeating Mount Stewart.

In the final pull the Ellerslie Huskies won over the Navy squad in two minutes. Coach of the Ellerslie team was Cyril Williams who really showed the boys the way to victory with his fine coaching performance.

The competition, the first of its kind at the carnival proved very interesting to the large number of spectators and it is hoped that next year a larger number of teams will participate.

Chairman of the tournament committee was G. Lorne Monkle, Summerside. Prizes to the winners will be presented Saturday evening by the newly crowned Sea Queen.

New Glasgow Rejects Fluoridation On Ballot

NEW GLASGOW — New Glasgow ratepayers Tuesday voted 340-1 against fluoridation of the town's water supply.

In the biggest plebiscite turnout since prohibition, citizens turned down the proposal by a 1,653-273 vote, a majority of 1,380. Eligible voters numbered 6,300. There were nine spoiled ballots in the total vote of 1,933, a 30 per cent turnout.

Mayor Power said the result of the plebiscite would settle the question in New Glasgow "at least for this generation."

The drive for fluoridation was led by the Local Council of Women headed by Mrs. J.R.H. Sutherland.

Town Council called for the ratepayers vote after several discussions on the issue, during which the mayor maintained that a decision was not up to the council.

Proceedings around the three voting booths were similar to provincial and federal elections, with voters being driven to and from polls, and scrutineers checking off names.

Voting was steady and at times brisk from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m.

In Ward One 69 voted for fluoridation, 635 voted against. There was one spoiled ballot and the total vote was 705. The majority against was 566.

In Ward Two 117 voted for, 602 against, there was one spoiled ballot, for a total vote of 720, with a majority of 485 against.

In Ward Three 87 voted for, 416 against, seven spoiled for, for a total of 510 votes, and a majority of 329 against.

Mayor Power said after the voting was known that he was pleased to have seen it go the way it did, and said he had no doubt that once the citizens thought the matter over for themselves, that they would turn down the proposal.

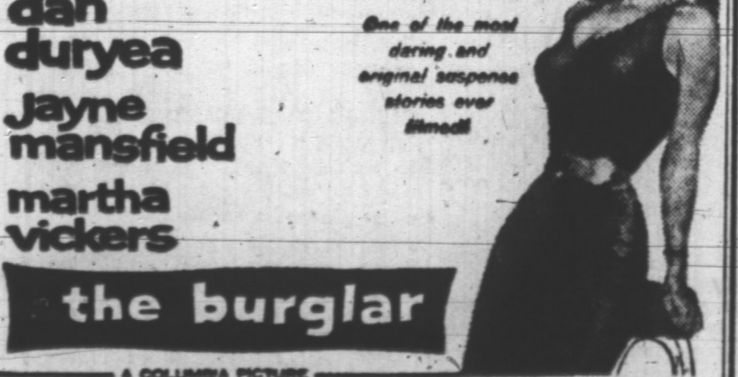
