OTTAWA (CP)—The government's price support policy for dairy products in this year starting May 1 likely will be announced in the next week or so.

Agriculture Minister Hays said Wednesday in the Commons.

Replying to Clement Vincent (P.C.—Nicolel-Yamaska), Mr. Hays said he was "glad" with the result of last year's policy. Prices had been higher than for a number of years and butter production had levelled off.

He hoped next year's price support program "will be even better."

The resolution recognized the benefits of concentrated milk products in the economy of the province, but suggested that as the concentrated products are sold in competition with fluid milk and have a tendency to lower the income of fluid milk producers, they should be brought under supervision of the milk board.

Spring Valley Man Found Dead In Home

The weather office saga ran full in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick ahead of a new disturbance recently formed west of Boston. The rain was mixed with snow or freezing rain in the Maritime provinces, while the mercury stayed near the freezing point.

This new disturbance will cross the Maritimes today giving rain but with relatively mild temperatures. It will likely push into the Maritimes late today producing showers or snowflurries over New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and much of mainland Nova Scotia.

Regional forecasts: Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties: Cloudy with scattered showers or flurries late in the afternoon; colder; gusty winds increase to afternoon to northwest 20. Low-high at Charlottetown and Moncton 30 and 38.

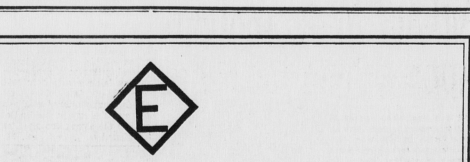
