During Mr. Williams' absence, Mr. Huggan, of the Intercolonial Railway staff will have charge of the accounting department here.

SIGNS OF AN EARLY SPRING.—In a garden, near London, England, the crocuses were in full bloom on the 14th of March, 1880, the 13th of March, 1881, and the 19th of February, 1882. Judged by this standard, the present season is three weeks earlier than the two preceding. Whether it is an advantage remains to be seen. On each of the dates above, the weather was sunny, but this year the temperature was higher than in the two years preceding.

A NEWFOUNDLAND despatch of the 31st ult., says:—"A favorable change has fairly commenced, and the ice is breaking up in Conception Bay. The Harbor Grace sealing fleet is expected to get clear of the ice to-night. One hundred and nine icebergs are in the neighborhood of Cape Basque, each sufficient to supply the American fishing fleet with ice to preserve bait for a quarter of a century. Ocean steamers plying between Great Britain must keep far east the next two months, otherwise accidents similar to the Arizona collision will frequently occur. The "Nimrod" which arrived at Port au Basque from the seal fishery yesterday, reports the steamers "Panther" and "Leopard" loaded.

TWO BEARS CAPTURED.—On Saturday evening last, two young lads, sons of Alfred and James Banks, went into the woods in Lot 56, to set snares for rabbits, and discovered what they supposed to be a fox hole, the snow being melted away, apparently by the breath of some animal. On looking into the hole, a large bear poked out his head. The lads immediately went home and gave the alarm, and on the following morning James and Alfred Banks proceeded to the place and captured the occupants of the den—two large bears, one of which was covered with a coat of fat two inches in thickness.

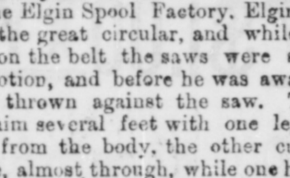
THE schr. "Roderick McRae," Captain DeCoe, arrived at Caribou Cove, on the 27th ult., with less of fore-boom and water casks. She was twelve days from Boston with general cargo for St. Pierre, Miquelon.

ACCIDENT.—A sad accident happened on the morning of the 30th ult., by which one Albert Hardy met his death. He was working in the Elgin Spool Factory, Elgin, N. B., tending the great circular, and while resting his arm on the belt the saws were suddenly set in motion, and before he was aware of it he was thrown against the saw. The saw threw him several feet with one leg almost severed from the body, the other cut about the knee, almost through, while one hand was terribly mangled. The poor man did not faint. He was carried to the nearest house and the doctor was summoned, but stated that it would be impossible for him to live. The sufferer said that if by taking off the leg it were possible to save his life he wished it done. On Friday afternoon Doctors McDonald, Burnett and Robinson amputated the limb. The injured man never came to his senses. He was buried, last Sunday, in the Methodist cemetery. Deceased was a native of Prince Edward Island. He came to this place, last September, bringing his wife. He used to often speak of his mother, who he said had endeavored to bring him up as a Christian. He seemed prepared for death and hoped for a bright future.—Com. by M. J. F.

EASTER MARKET.—To-day was the largest market since Christmas. Every department was full, sales were brisk, and prices moderate. The meat market was particularly fine. The display of beef, mutton, etc., excellent, and the competition rather lively. Messrs. Blake Brook's exhibit of Easter beef was, of course, a good one. The meats in their stall were, as usual, tastefully arranged, and over five thousand pounds of prime beef were laid out for the inspection and selection of customers. Mr. George Thorne's stall was also tastefully arranged. The quarters on sale not only bore labels of their weight, but photographs of the animals, of which they once formed an "important part." The dead weight of the prize heifer butchered and on sale by Mr. Thorne, was 1015 lbs., and that of the Cow 830 lbs. Mr. M. Wheatley's stall was one of the most attractive, and among the carcasses on sale was that of a heifer one year and ten months old the dead weight of which was 650 lbs. Messrs. Saunders & Newsum had a nice selection of beef in their stall. Among it was the carcass of a prize heifer, fed by Mr. J. W. Holman, the dead weight of which was 631 lbs.; an ox, fed by Mr. Dollar, 638 lbs.; and another ox, fed by Mr. Campbell, 650 lbs. Mr. Brown's stall is one of the most popular, and to-day was well supplied with the best beef the fine settlement of Little York could produce. Mr. Robert Brydges, Mr. Mullins, Mr. Henry McGregor, Mr. Burris, Mr. Drake, John McNeill, Mr. Trainor, Henry Wood and others showed some fine and well dressed carcasses. The price of beef ranged from 10 to 16 cents, pork the same as usual (6 1/2 and 7 cents), butter 20 to 25 cents, eggs 12 to 16 cents.
