"Conspirator" starring Robert Taylor and Elizabeth Taylor on the Capitol screen, makes full use of its engrossing dramatic premise, that of a lovely young American girl who, on a visit to England, marries a romantic officer of the Royal Fusilier Guards, finds her marriage slipping and her husband gradually growing away from her, and finally discovers the shocking reason for the break-up—a discovery which determines her husband to murder her.

RENT CONTROL
Now that rent control has been relinquished by the Federal Government, the question arises: Who is going to pick up the burden which the Dominion Government has dropped? Our Provincial government is apparently opposed to having anything to do with rent control, preferring to let the municipalities handle it. As far as the Summerside Council is concerned, the buck passed to it by the Jones administration will probably be tossed right back into the Provincial government's lap. His Worship, Mayor Wedge, is opposed to Municipal control on the grounds that there are many houses outside the town limits whose landlords would not be subject to restrictions as landlords of houses close by, but in the town, would be. Justice would in consequence not be done. The even-handed instrument it is supposed to be, Mayor Wedge seems to have an argument there. If our Island tenants are to be treated alike, it seems imperative that such control be exercised on a Province-wide scale rather than by municipalities. Pursuing this argument to its logical conclusion, however, it would seem that federal control is the ideal condition, insuring that everyone across Canada be treated alike.

Fighting Inflation
One of the anti-inflationary measures of the Dominion Government has turned out to be a veritable anti-trade degree. The stipulation that car buyers must pay half the price as a down payment, and pay the balance within a year is proving too much for the ordinary wage-earner. In many cases he can't raise the down payment, and if he can, he still finds the high monthly payments beyond his budget. In Montreal, used-car sellers are offering unbelievable premiums in the way of gasoline, etc., but still can't dispose of their cars.
The measure seems to be defeating the very purpose for which it is fashioned. The only objection we have to inflation is that it places commodities at prohibitive prices so that unnecessary spending will be eliminated and costs will come down. But is not the purchase of a car for the ordinary family of today necessary spending, or are they to be satisfied with the bare necessities that will keep them alive but not permit them to enjoy life.
Our present standard of living demands that we have not only a chicken in every pot, but also a car in every garage, even if it is only a rattle trap that will take the family to the shore on weekends and holidays.
We haven't quite reached that stage, but that is the ideal to which we have been working. Austerity for the common man only is the condition which created such a large number of Communist converts in the Old World. When austerity hits all classes alike, that is a different situation. Everyone feels that he is making sacrifices for the good of the country and his fellow man.

adore God. It only takes ten minutes to say the beautiful prayers of the Rosary. He announced that on June 10th it is hoped to have every Catholic family in the Province pledged to daily prayer.
On June 3rd all people will be asked to make the pledge. Father Peyton explained that this crusade began in 1948 in the diocese of London, Ont. where 90,000 pledges were given. It was such a success that in two years time God had doubled the number of seminarians and the postulants in convents, he said. Since that time it has spread across Canada, the United States and Britain. "God and Mary looked on Canada to lead the way," Father Peyton stated that he came to the use of reason and grew to manhood in a Rosary home where every evening his father and mother and the family knelt down and said the Rosary.
He told of how just two years before he was ordained a priest he was stricken with tuberculosis. "I asked Our Lady to pray for me and she answered my prayers. She used her influence with her Son and I got well." He said that he then determined to devote his life, in thanksgiving to putting the Rosary back in homes. In conclusion he said that "Your prayers in this 20th century, will give an answer to men who hate God."

Approximately 6,000 people from all parts of Prince County were present yesterday at the Summerside Driving Park to hear Father Patrick Peyton of the Congregation of Holy Cross exhort them to return to the practice of daily family prayer. The rally was held in connection with the Family Rosary Crusade now under way in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia under the direction of Father Peyton. A similar rally will be held in Charlottetown next week.
The program was opened by Mayor Henry Wedge as chairman of the parish committee for the crusade and he extended a welcome to His Excellency, Bishop James Boyle and to Father Peyton.
He said that Father Peyton is devoting his life to the great cause of prayer because he is convinced of its necessity and power, especially when directed through Mary "who is the mother of God and our mother." Mayor Wedge said he was gratified to see such large numbers present and he hoped that they would return to their homes resolved to pray the Rosary every day of their lives. Bishop Boyle said he was thrilled and inspired by the magnificent assembly particularly as it is a busy time of year and sacrifice was necessary to attend. "It shows the importance you are giving to the things of God and the things of the spirit," he said.
Bishop Boyle explained that the aim of the crusade is to enlist every Catholic family in a joint crusade of prayer. Catholics should say the Rosary to Jesus through Mary. He said that prayer was once very prevalent in all Catholic and Protestant homes but has now vanished from many of them. It is hoped to restore this practice of family prayer in all homes.
