LET'S EAT

Instant Minced Onion Practical Cooking Aid

"It is my considered opinion, madame, that this new instant minced onion is very useful," remarked the chef.

"It is onion at its best, vacuum dried, ready to use with no preparation whatever. It reconstitutes in water or any type of hot moisture within two minutes and in cold moisture within five minutes."

APPETIZING DISH
"I added a tablespoon of instant onion when pan-frying potatoes. They were soft and delicately browned by the time the potatoes fried. It makes the most appetizing onion-scrambled eggs, gives fine flavor to sauces and French dressing and picks up the flavor of canned fish."

"A tablespoon of instant onion added to one-quarter cup water to reconstitute it equals one-quarter cup minced fresh onion; three-quarters of a teaspoon of instant minced onion equals one tablespoon minced fresh onion."

"For dishes calling for small quantities of onion, chef, it is the practical, economical answer," I replied.

"I understand that instant onion is now nationally distributed under various brand names. It will certainly be welcomed by every homemaker whose eyes tear easily from fresh onion and who finds it difficult to remove onion-odor from her hands."

Instant minced onion soup: Combine 1/2 c. instant minced onion, 2-3 c. non-fat dry milk. Gradually add to 4 c. cold chicken or beef bouillon. Mix well.

Add 1/2 tsp. ground white pepper. Stir - cook only until hot. Serve at once. Garnish with parsley. Serves 6.

Note: If desired, replace chicken or beef bouillon with 4 bouillon cubes dissolved in 4 c. boiling water.

Tomorrow's dinner: Instant minced onion soup, lamb pilaff, oven-fried eggplant, romaine salad, lime sherbet or fruit cup, hot or iced coffee or tea, milk.

Lamb pilaff: Remove bones and excess fat from 2 1/2 lbs. stewing lamb. Cut the meat into bite-sized pieces. Place in a heavy saucepan. Slow-fry until any remaining fat begins to run.

Add 1 tsp. instant minced onion and 4 c. water; slow-cook until golden.

Sit in 2 1/2 oz. cans seasoned tomato sauce. 4 can-measures hot water, 1/2 tsp. mint flakes, 2 tsp. salt and 1 tsp. pepper. Bake in

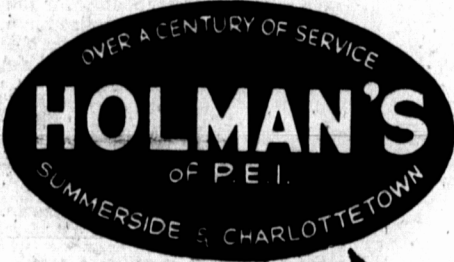


AT QUEENS U.
