Alex Campbell Attacks Attitude

Deploping the "inexcusably low wage structure which prevails in all brackets of business and industry on the Island", Liberal leader Alex Campbell declared at a meeting in the Regional High School auditorium over the holiday weekend, that "Islanders today are paying the price of a take-it-for-grant attitude which is common among governments too long in office."

"The present government," said Mr. Campbell "is so sure of its course that it has become offensively arrogant, so set in its way that it has become blind to the challenge of progress." He compared the Shaw government to a person who tries to sing a song without knowing the tune — only the words, "which become meaningless and uninspiring in the monotone in which they are delivered."

Liberal Leader States Answer

Alex Campbell, provincial Liberal leader, stated in a television broadcast Friday night that he was asked the following question by a wage earner who stopped by a Campbell on Great George street: "How can a man keep a family on \$45 a week these days, buy groceries and pay \$70 a month rent?"

In a television broadcast Friday night Mr. Campbell answered the question by saying: "he can't if he wants to provide his family with essential needs. He can't if he wants to provide his children with the kind of education they must have if they are to make their way in a modern world."

"We all know we have the lowest wages in Canada, we know that wages are rising faster in other provinces than they are here and we know too that things are not likely to change very much if the present government is returned to office," said the Liberal leader.

"This must be changed. The low wage structure must end. We will take firm action that will result in real changes. We invite all people to join with us to change the wage situation."

"The present government is set in its ways and cannot be expected to move in exciting new fields — it is the victim of its own inaction. Caught in this quandary, the present government over the past two or three years has shown the strain of this impossible situation."

"The number of children of Islanders today living outside this province because we have refused to change our attitudes towards development on this Island is in the tens of thousands."

Mr. Campbell concluded by saying "A Liberal government will deal firmly with Ottawa and will work in co-operation with a maximum advantage of the federal sharing programs, under which, in many cases, Ottawa will pay 90 per cent of the costs

Car Sustains Heavy Damage

An automobile sustained approximately \$2,000 when it struck a utility pole in Cross Roads district on the Trans Canada highway Sunday about 11:15 p.m.

The Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP reported the driver's name as Angus MacLean of Montague who was taken to hospital in Charlottetown along with passengers in the vehicle.

A spokesman at the P.E.I. Hospital said the victims were attended by Dr. Malcolm Putnam and released upon examination.

Power in Cross Roads east of the Cross Roads district was off for a short period until workmen spliced the damaged pole, a spokesman of Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. said.

Dave Price To Visit Here

A vista of new markets is seen by tourist-resort operators with news that Dave Price, Florida newscaster, will be visiting this province on June 10.

Word of his coming was announced by Lieut. Col. E.W. Johnstone, Burlington, President of the P.E.I. Tourist Association; who said it had been decided to hold the association semi-annual meeting to coincide with his visit.

Mr. Price, practically the voice of Canada so far as Canadians visiting in the state are concerned, has both radio and television newscasts in Florida with his principal program titled "Canada Calling" as he gives news of home to those down south for the winter. His listening audience is considered a prime source of summertime tourist business.

Col. Johnstone said the association would hold its meeting in order to give members a chance to meet and hear Mr. Price who will be guest speaker at the evening dinner. The regular semi-annual business will be transacted by the members at an afternoon meeting starting at 2 o'clock. A reception will be tendered Mr. Price at 6 with dinner scheduled for 7 o'clock.

Leading Role For Eric House

Artistic Director Mavor Moore Saturday announced that Eric House will play a leading role in "The Ottawa Man", one of the three feature productions at the Confederation Centre.

Mr. House, whose contract was signed only last week, will play the mayor in Mr. Moore's comedy, based on Gogol's "The Inspector General".

He also has a smaller role in the new Donald Harron-Norman Campbell musical "The Adventures of Private Tuhey".

In "The Ottawa Man", Mr. House will appear with Donald Harron in the title role and Kate Reid as the mayor's wife.

This will be the second summer in Charlottetown for the talented performer. Last summer he appeared with John Drainie and Dave Broadfoot in "Laugh With Leacock", consistently breaking up appreciative audiences as a patronizing bank clerk, an Oxford professor, an unsuccessful spy and a bilingual golfer.

Mr. House's comic gifts are well-known to a wide international audience, for he has performed in England and the United States as well as Canada. His many Stratford Festival successes includes Gilbert and Sullivan as well as Shakespeare.

The actor's latest performance was a starring role in the Crest Theatre production of Jean Anouilh's black comedy "Poor Bitou", a role which he also created last fall at the Charles Playhouse in Boston.

About Half-Renew Books

Employees unemployment insurance stamp books have been renewed by about half of all employers in Kings and Queens counties.

C.L. Winchester, Insurance Branch Supervisor of the Charlottetown Office, said that letters were sent to 1,600 employers advising them on the annual renewal of the books. Of this number, just over 800 employers have returned a total of 5,500 employees books.

Mr. Winchester requested the immediate co-operation of the remaining employers in returning the balance of last year's books. Any further delay would conceivably create problems for the employees in the event that they changed employment, or later in the year, filed claims for benefits.
