LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

GOING TO HALIFAX.—The entries for the athletic sports at Halifax on Saturday include L. R. Unsworth, D. A. McKinnon, L. B. MacMillan and C. J. McMillan, all of Charlottetown.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship Bishop Macdonald will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation at Kinkora at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning next, 12th inst., and at Seven Mile Bay on Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—At the regular meeting held last evening several applications for transfers from one school to another were read. Only two were granted, however, and these in a case where the class room was over-crowded. Mr. William Newson was engaged to teach in West Kent School during Mr. Yeo's illness.

LECTURE.—Rev. E. O. Taylor's lecture in Zion Church last evening was attended by a good audience. His subject was "A Glass of Beer Analysed," and the physiological aspect of the drink question was treated in a very clever manner. Rev. Mr. Taylor left this morning for Souris and other points. On Friday evening he will deliver another lecture in the Baptist church on "Bible Wine."

MATCH RACE.—The match race between H. Couissarat, of Montreal, and Lorne Unsworth, of Charlottetown, attracted about 1000 people to the Athletic Association's new grounds last evening. The race was for a mile, best two out of three heats. Couissarat gained the first two heats by about a length. Both contestants put up an honest race, and Couissarat's victory was loudly applauded. The time in both heats was 2.36. B. C. Prowse paced the racers for three quarters in the first heat, and in the second heat Reggie Stewart performed a similar duty. After the match Couissarat gave a very good exhibition of trick riding. Unsworth and Couissarat were both cheered after the races.

BOSTON'S SUBWAY OPENED.—The Boston subway was opened to the public last Wednesday morning. There was little or no demonstration in connection with the event other than that occasioned by a great rush to ride on the first car entering the big hole. From the Public Garden entrance to Park street the trip was made in a little over four minutes. From this on there was a stream of cars, about 3 to the minute, all of which carried freights. Up to noon it was estimated that almost 50,000 people had ridden in the subway, and this number was increased to over 100,000 when the gates were closed at midnight. The contract for building the last section near the Union station has been awarded and work started. The Transit Commissioners believe that before next summer the entire subway will be in use and Tremont street entirely free from cars.

WORTH WAITING FOR.—As Labor Day sports are over, leaving behind them the record of many pleasures; it is only right that future pleasure should also be considered, and it is indeed good news to learn that during the three first evenings of exhibition week, the Halifax Amateur Dramatic Club, of Halifax, will make their second appearance here giving as an opening bill, that great success in the dramatic line "June." A committee with the laudable object of increasing the New Cathedral Fund, brings the Halifax company here and they could not have done better in their choice. The company comes provided with special scenery, so that they will be able to produce with full dramatic effect, the "Sawmill" scene in the first bill "June" which has always been one of the strong points of this play. The specialties to be introduced are "out of sight" and an evening of rare pleasures is in store for those who keep the 20th free to attend the Opera House.
