THE SITUATION IN SOUTH AFRICA

Bombardment Still Continues at Ladysmith.

Troopships Continually arriving at the Cape — Dr. Jamieson leaves for England—Boer shells not doing much harm at Ladysmith—Mafeking not heard from.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The long range bombardment of Ladysmith with heavy guns continues daily but without serious damage to the beleaguered camp.

A late despatch from Kimberley, dated November 10, reported the Boers throwing shells at the reservoir and the water-works, but the Boers are avoiding an attack at close quarters.

The enemy's shells are of a very inferior quality, and many of them do not explode. No news has been received for several days from Mafeking. The town is completely invested but it seems to be resolutely holding out under Colonel Baden Powell.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The veil of mystery surrounding the recent happenings in the war areas in South Africa is still unlifted and nothing has been heard from any important point later than Nov. 9. The alleged Boer threats to shoot British officers in case a certain supposed spy is punished lack confirmation, and best informed newspapers wholly discredit the story.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Earl Kimberley, the Liberal leader in the House of Lords, in a speech at Newcastle last night said the present war was an absolute necessity. He refused to believe that the Colonial Secretary, Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, had ever been guilty of acting in such a way as to provoke war. The worst that could be charged against him was that he had been guilty of bad diplomacy.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 15.—Dr. Jamieson has sailed for England. The transport Harlech Castle has arrived here.

SECOND EDITION.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 15.—An undated despatch from Mafeking received by runner via Magalapye, Nov. 8 says:

"To-day all is quiet. We have been bombarded pretty heavily all week. On Friday night, Captain Fitzclarence and Lieutenant Swainburne, with D. Squadron of the Protectorate Regiment, made a magnificent bayonet charge upon the Boer entrenchments, driving them from their positions and bayoneting large numbers of the Boers, who must have lost very heavily. The charge was most gallant and determined. The party however, could not hold the trenches; and they unfortunately lost six killed, two prisoners and nine wounded in their retirement.

The bombardment has been most ineffectual. Everyone remains under shell-proof cover. So far the shells have only wounded one man. The town is most cheerful and determined to resist attack to the utmost limit.

On Friday night, Jan Botha, a well-known Boer commandant, told a man with an ambulance party that their loss had been very heavy during the recent engagements and that his heart was very sore.

The wounded include Captain Fitzclarence and Lieutenant Swainburne, both slightly injured.

THE LOSS OF THE CHARLESTON.

This Splendid Cruiser Lost at Sea.

SHE RAN ON AN UNCHARTED
CORAL REEF,

And Had to be Abandoned by Officers
and Men.

MANILA, Nov. 15.—Further details regarding the grounding of the United States cruiser Charleston show that she struck on an uncharted coral reef ten miles east of Karingin Island. Her stern was almost submerged, and her bow almost out of the water. A heavy sea was on and the cruiser began rolling violently. The water-tight doors were quickly closed, but were stove in under the engine department.

After the first efforts to right her the officers feared that she might slide off on account of the heavy sea and therefore abandoned the attempt to save her. They hurried to the boats and rowed away prepared to fight for a landing with two colt guns and a hundred and thirty-four rifles. They had with them ten days' rations. Some of the officers and men were dressed only in pyjamas and their underclothing.
