**Age Of Buried Trees At Quebec Is Problem**

QUEBEC (CP)—A Quebec geologist is trying to estimate the age of trees buried for centuries.  
The problem was given Paul-Emile Auger, professor of applied geology in Laval University's faculty of science, when a number of trees were found 20 feet below the surface of the earth during recent excavation work in a lower section of Quebec.  
After examining the wood and the excavation, Mr. Auger concluded the trees probably had been buried here by Jacques Cartier arrived here in 1534—perhaps as much as 25,000 to 30,000 years before.

The only way to compute wood age with much accuracy, the geologist said, is to measure the content of carbon 14—the amount of which determines the extent of decay.  
Samples of the wood have been sent to Yale University to have their carbon-14 content measured, but in the meantime, Mr. Auger has some interesting theories.  
He believes the wood, which had the yellowish color of decay when dug up but which quickly turned black on contact with air, was buried beneath the former bed of Lake Champlain. The trees could have been swept into the lake by an incoming river, he said, or they could have fallen from the bank and been covered with sediment.  
In the not too distant past, from a geologist's standpoint, Lake Champlain was many times its present size and extended at least to the cliffs which now separate Quebec's upper town and lower town, Mr. Auger said.

**NEW EXPERIENCE FOR MANY**  
Canadian Airmen In Naples

NAPLES (CP)—If there are any more at home like Gina Lollobrigida, they stay indoors.  
Canadians eye-searching for Italian beauties report that they have looked in vain so far and are preparing to move on to Rome at the first leave opportunity.  
Airmen working for the United Nations Middle East police force at their base here are getting acclimatized quickly as troops do the world over. On their first night in town—Saturday, Nov. 24—many got their bearings by walking around until nearly dawn. Others with less rugged feet hired horse-drawn hacks.  
FIRST IMPRESSIONS  
Few of the airmen or Canadian soldiers passing through on their way to Suez have been in Italy before. But they have caught on in job time to one rule for foreigners: Never pay the asking price for anything. The Italians relish bargaining and, needless to say, are adept at it. The more leisurely the transaction, the better they like it.  
The first thing that strikes Canadians about Naples, after the beauty of its harbor, is the mad driving of the horn-blowing Italians. Canadians riding in buses or taxis shut their eyes and hope for the best.  
The RCAF's 435 Squadron ferrying UN troops to Suez from Naples, soon decided not to venture downtown with its vehicles. It has hired buses—all squadron members live downtown, about 20 minutes from the airfield—at \$35 a day. It figures this will be cheaper in the long run than repairing dented fenders.  
There is a saying here that Naples has six main streets and the squares and alleys.  
Naples is a city of about 1,500,000. The rest are alleys. Certainly direction-finding is baffling among

**TOSS DYNAMITE**  
WINNIPEG (CP)—Six sticks of dynamite tossed from a speeding car Tuesday smashed against a central police station window here, in what was thought to be an attempt to blow up a portion of the police station.  
The dynamite, tied in a bundle with a fuse attached to one stick, was found on the sidewalk directly under the office window of Fred E. Law, magistrate and clerk of the court.  
The dynamite was discovered by a police constable on his way to work.

**Floating Lumber Camp Off Maine**  
BUCKSPORT, Me. (AP)—A floating lumber camp is operating off Maine's coast travelling from island to island to cut pulpwood. The camp resembles those of the northwoods, except that it is afloat, on three barges towed by a 70-foot tug.  
Wilfred Pepper of Waterville designed the ocean-going lumber camp five years ago for the St. Regis Paper Co. of Bucksport. Engaged in cutting pulp on Maine islands for 15 years, Pepper figured it would cut costs and facilitate handling if the lumberjacks could take their camp with them instead of building a new one on every island and then abandoning it in a few weeks.  
USED BARGES  
Pepper utilized government surplus barges. One is 110 feet long and 31 feet wide. It carries a 26-x-30-foot cook house equipped with hotel-size stoves, a huge food freezer, refrigerator and other equipment found in a good kitchen. Arnold Hall of Presque Isle, an old time woods cool, presides over the range. It is a power plant which furnishes 110 volts of lighting. A bunk house has space for 22 men in doublebed beds—also army surplus. There also is a 26-x-30-foot recreation room and storage space.  
USUAL STYLE  
Buildings are patterned after the usual main wood structures—sturdy construction with heavy tar paper over side and roof boarding.  
Another barge, of equal size, carries loaded pulpwood. The third unit has loading equipment including a chain drag line which takes pulp from the water. Pulp cut on an island is moved to the shore and dumped into a 100-foot-square boom to prevent the logs from floating to sea. The boom holds about 75 cords of pulpwood in four-foot lengths.  
The tug David, which has three diesel engines and can develop 750 horsepower, tows the masses of pulp alongside the loading barge which swings it aboard the stern of a craft. Then Capt. Merle Bunker sets his course for the mill in Bucksport, at the mouth of the Penobscot River, barges in tow.  
The floating lumber camp goes to sea in May and travels from island to island until storms send it to its winter mooring.  
Six massive anchors hold the "fleet" in position at its island position. Radio keeps the crew in touch with the mill at Bucksport. The tug also has ship-to-shore telephone.
