UCLA Captures Rose Bowl; Unbeaten Records Topple

By MURRAY CHASS Associated Press Sports Writer University of California, Los Angeles, Louisiana State and Alabama wiped out the three remaining perfect records among U.S. college football's top 10 and muddled the race for the national championship Saturday, defeating Michigan State Arkansas and Nebraska in post-season bowl games. UCLA, behind the play of quarterback Gary Beban and defensive back Bob Stiles, outlasted No. 1 Michigan State 14-12 in the Rose Bowl; Joe Labruzzo powered Louisiana State to a 14-7 triumph over No. 2 Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl and No. 4 Alabama outslugged No. 3 Nebraska 39-28 on Steve Sloan's passing in the Orange Bowl.

In the only other bowl game Saturday, the Sugar, No. 6 Mississippi edged Florida 20-18. The losses for Michigan State and Nebraska marred 10-0 records. In Arkansas' case, the longest winning streak in U.S. college football, 22 games ended. In all cases, the previously unbeaten teams suffered badly in their hopes for gaining the national championship, to be decided Tuesday in a poll of The Associated Press' special panel of sports writers and broadcasters. Stiles started UCLA on its way when he intercepted his first two passes and traced 42 yards to the Spartan 43. After UCLA got nowhere in three plays, it punted. However, Michigan State's Don Japigia fumbled the ball after catching it and John Erquiaga recovered for UCLA. Beban scored two plays later. On the ensuing kickoff, UCLA tried an onside kick and grabbed the ball on the Michigan 42. Beban quickly set up his second score with a 27-yard pass to Kurt Altenberg. Arkansas took a 7-0 lead against Louisiana State when Joe Brittenum hit Bobby Crockett on a 19-yard pass, but Louisiana came back for a pair of touchdowns in the second quarter. Labruzzo scored them both, smashing across from three yards and one yard. Labruzzo carried the ball four straight times from the Arkansas 16 for the first score and three times from the five for the second.

Wings End Leafs' Streak; Montreal, Chicago Win

DETROIT (CP)—Detroit Red Wings whipped Toronto Maple Leafs 4-0 Sunday night on goalie Roger Crozier's third shutout in the last four games to snap Toronto's 10-game unbeaten string. It was the little goaltender's fifth shutout of the season, tops in the National Hockey League, and the Wings made it easy for him in the final period when he had to face only three shots. Detroit, which had an even-game victory run broken last month by the Leafs, leapfrogged Toronto into third place by one point in the league standings. Ironically, Leafs 10-game unbeaten string equalled a Leaf record set in 1963 when the club also went 10 games without defeat before being edged 2-1 by the Wings. Parker MacDonald, who returned to Detroit Thursday in a trade with Boston Bruins and reunited with his old linemates Gordie Howe and Alex Delvecchio, scored his first goal since returning and set up Howe for another. Norm Ullman and Paul Henderson scored the other Detroit goals as the Wings ended the Leafs' string at eight victories and two ties.

OPENED SCORING Ullman gave Crozier all the lead he needed at 5:17 of the first period when he stole the puck from Bob Pulford of Toronto inside the Leaf blue line, fought his way to the net and beat Johnny Bower with a short shot for his 15th goal. Bower was partially screened by defenceman Larry Hillman. MacDonald followed with his seventh of the season at 8:47, a hard, low shot after a pass from Delvecchio. Henderson, a right hander, moved to left wing on the Ullman line, scored his 10th of the season at 6:41 of the second period, backhanding in Floyd Smith's rebound. Bower made a fine glove save on a shot by Ullman and then a 10 p.p.e. Smith's try, but was flat on the ice when Henderson scored. Toronto had just three shots on goal in the last period and 21 for the game compared with 33 for Detroit, which now has beaten the Leafs four times in six games. Toronto's last previous loss was to the Wings, 5-1 here Dec. 5 and this was Crozier's second shutout over Toronto.

CHICAGO (AP) - Goals by Bobby Hull and Chico Maki in the final four minutes gave Chicago Black Hawks a 3-1 victory over Boston Bruins Sunday night in a National Hockey League game. The triumph kept the Black Hawks atop the league standings by a point over Montreal Canadiens, who beat New York Rangers 6-3 Sunday night. Hull broke a 1-1 tie with his 29th goal of the season at 16:16 of the last period, a second after Boston's Ed Westfall had emerged from the penalty box and while Bruin Ted Green still was serving a penalty. Maki clinched the Hawks' 19th victory in less than two minutes later, when he converted on a picture-pass from Hull near the corner of the Bruins' net.

JOHNSTON GREAT The Hawks' late surge spoiled what would have been a moral victory for Boston goalie Ed Johnston had the last-place crew been able to hang onto the tie. The veteran netminder, who returned to the Bruins from the minors less than a month ago, turned in a brilliant performance most of the way against a Hawk attack that peppered him with 41 shots. Time and again he blocked point-blank shots after the Hawks had worked through the Bruins' defence.

BORDEN NATS Topple Eagles SUMMERSIDE - The Borden Nationals iced the RCAF Eagles 6-3 at the local RCAF station yesterday to continue their domination of the Prince County Hockey League. Jim MacLeod and Gerald Cutcliff led the Nats with a pair of goals each. Charlie Sark was outstanding for the Borden club in more ways than one, playing an excellent game and collecting two assists but also getting four of the eight penalties in the game, including a misconduct and game misconduct at 17:29 of the final session. The Nationals were in command all the way, taking the lead at 2:40 of the first period on Jim MacLeod's first goal, having the game tied up at 5:20 on Gagnon's unassisted marker for the airmen, but taking the lead to stay at 10:44 on a goal by Donnie MacWilliams, assisted by Taylor and Sark.

LAUNCHES NEW YORK Jean Ratelle started a Ranger comeback that netted three goals inside six minutes late in the period. Ratelle's ninth goal of the season came on a tip-in with New York enjoying a two-man advantage at 10:31. Donnie Marshall hit on a power play 59 seconds later and then Ratelle tipped in Jim Neilson's slap shot at 16:49. Montreal coach Toe Blake copied his Ranger counterpart Emile Francis' tactic of switching goalies in mid-game. Blake sent ex-Ranger Gump Worsley out to replace starter Charlie Hodge as the third period began.

Sherbrooke Beavers Lead Ahearne Match

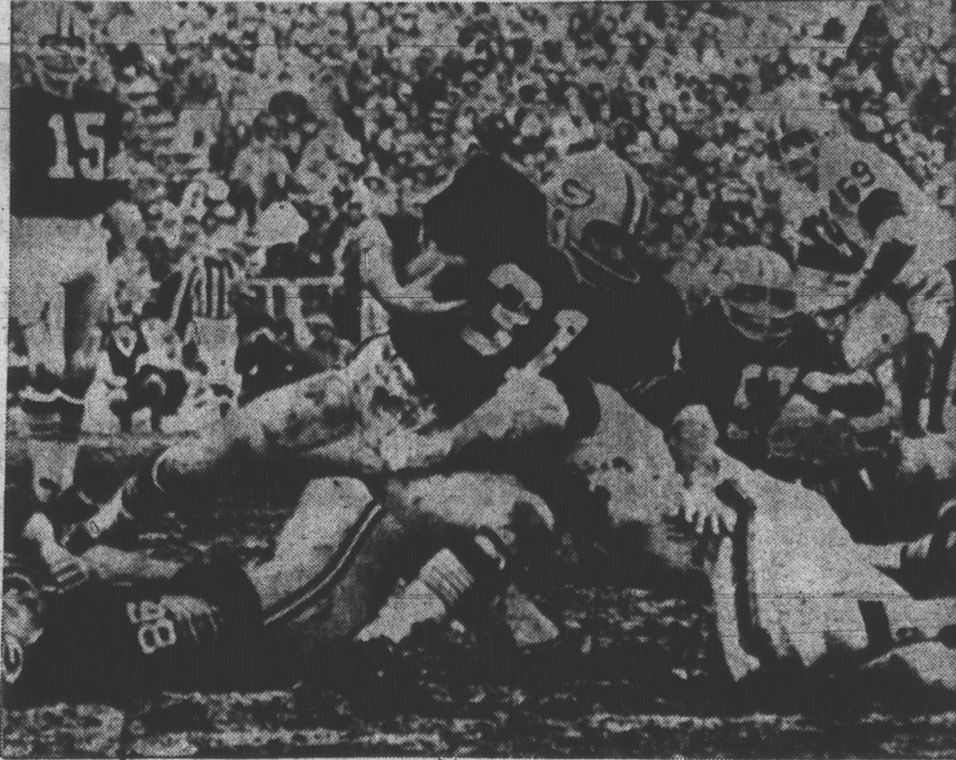
STOCKHOLM (CP - AP) - Sherbrooke Beavers split a pair of weekend games with Leksand to move into a first-place tie with the Swedish team in the Ahearne Cup hockey tournament. Leksand defeated Canada's 1965 Allan Cup champions 4-2 Saturday, but the Beavers came back with a 2-0 victory Sunday. Leksand and the Canadian team each have 3-2 won-lost records. Soderstrom of Sweden has a 2-1 record and another Swedish team, Djurgarden, has a 0-3 record.

Rugged Green Bay Packers Outhit Browns For Ch'ship

(AP) - Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung charged through the snow, rain and fog and Don Chandler kicked three field goals Sunday to lead Green Bay to the National Football League championship with a 23-12 victory over the defending Cleveland Browns. Playing their old style ball control game, designed by coach Vince Lombardi, Taylor chewed up Cleveland's line while the Packers' brilliant defence shut out the great Jim Brown. COLLINS SCORED Cleveland struck back quickly after Starr's early touchdown pass to Dale and stunned the big crowd with a TD on three passes that ate up only 61 seconds. The payoff pitch was from Ryan to Gary Collins, the man who scored three touchdowns a year ago in the Browns' upset of Baltimore Colts. Then came the break that put the Browns in the hole. Lou Groza, who had made 96 consecutive points after touchdown in recent years, was set for the equalizer. The snap appeared a bit off and was fumbled by Bobby Franklin, the holder. Groza grabbed the ball and threw a forward pass to Franklin in a desperate try for the conversion. Wood stacked up Franklin on the five. A short punt by Chandler led the Browns to get into field goal position mid-way in the first quarter. The 41-year-old veteran Groza calmly booted the three-pointer from the 24, sending Cleveland out front 9-7. Groza, who was to kick another later, has the all-time title game record with 10 field goals out of 17 attempts. The Packers took charge late in that exciting first quarter and, with the help of a 34-yard run by Hornung, moved into field goal range. SETTLED FOR FIELD GOAL In fact the Packers penetrated to the Browns' three early in the second but had to settle for the field goal by Chandler from the 15 after Starr was thrown trying to pass. Ryan was trying desperately to get the Browns back in the ball game, but his pass, intended for Leroy Kelly, was picked off by Wood on the Browns' 25 and returned to the 10. After a penalty and three incomplete passes, Chandler

Cleveland's Walt Beach intercepted a Starr pass on the Green Bay 30 in the final seconds of the first half and Groza kicked a 28-yard field goal, making it 13-12 at the half with the missed extra-point standing out as the difference. The Packers took charge in the second half. With the offensive line providing fine blocking for Taylor and Hornung, while Starr possessed the defence with an occasional pass. Green Bay moved 90 yards in 11 plays that ate up six minutes, 49 seconds on the clock before Hornung went over on the 13-yard sweep. Bart Starr, racked up last Sunday on the first play of the bitterly contested playoff game with Baltimore Colts, hit Carroll Dale with a 47-yard touchdown pass in 3:52 of the first quarter.
