CARDIFF, Wales (Reuters) — Edward Nelson, blind for 20 years, saw his wife and children Monday for the first time.

When bandages were removed after an eye operation, he greeted his wife with: "You must be the woman I married."

Nelson, 49, works as an accountant at an explosives factory. He was blinded when acid spurted in his face in a laboratory accident.

This year a new development in the technique of corneal grafting in eye surgery brought him new hope.

An operation was performed and Monday Mrs. Nelson and Robert, 14, and Dorothy, 8, were brought to the hospital.
