The Russian army has been almost doubled since the last Turkish war, while the general staff has been increased by more than two-thirds. The three western frontier districts, Vilna, Kieff, and Warsaw, now have 584 battalions, 396 squadrons, and 272 batteries, with 2,070 guns, all on a war footing, or about six-sevenths of all the infantry, and five-sixths of all the cavalry, and infantry which Germany keeps up in time of peace.
