

Beavers Defeat Glace Bay Miners 2-1 In Second Overtime Period

GLACE BAY, N. S., March 30 — (CP)—Saint John Beavers took a stranglehold on the Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals Saturday, defeating Glace Bay Miners 2-1 in a second overtime period.

Saint John leads the best-of-seven series 3-1 with the fifth game slated for Saint John tomorrow.

Ken Watson broke the deadlock on a solo effort at 4:51 of the sudden death period. It was his second goal.

Miners took the lead midway through the second period when veteran Pete Wywrot scored on passes from Len Haley and Sheldon Bloomer, but Watson tied the score within 10 seconds of the third. Johnny Arundel and Pete Langelle drew assists.

Miners held a territorial edge throughout most of the contest, but couldn't get anything out of the overtime period. Miners directed nine shots at Beaver's Hal Gordon compared to two stopped by Bob Arnel.

St. Mary's Defeat Islanders 5-4 To Win Semi-finals 4-0

HALIFAX, March 30 — (Special)—Danny Nixon's desperation shot from an almost impossible angle after nearly fourteen minutes of overtime here Saturday night gave the Halifax Saints a 5-4 win over the Charlottetown Islanders and won for Halifax the semi-final series in the Maritime Major Hockey League in four straight games.

Nixon's goal ended one of the most colorful and dramatic play-off games staged here and washed out a great bid by the Islanders to get back in the series after they had lost the first three games.

And for the third time in the series the Saints came from behind to win. After being outplayed by the Islanders and trailing 4-1, with less than eight minutes left, the Saints came back to score three goals and send the game into overtime.

The teams battled through one 10-minute over-time without any change in the score and then commenced sudden-death play. A minute and forty-five seconds after the second over-time period started, Nixon drew a holding penalty and almost became the goat of the game.

But ten seconds after he got back on the ice the Saints defenseman blocked a shot at his own blueline and raced down the left hand side. He was chased to the corner by Phil Vitale and let a shot go at the net. The puck struck the far goal post and bounced over the goal line to end the series.

Following the game goalie Ray Frederick stated that he expected Nixon to pass the puck out to winger Johnny Morrow who was racing down centre ice uncovered.

The loss was a heartbreaker for the Islanders who were the better team on the ice but a combination of almost unbelievable events cost the Islanders the game.

The Islanders were playing a man short when Bob Drainville scored an off-side goal to make the score 4-2 with barely more than seven minutes left. Then Phil Vitale drew a questionable penalty for falling on the puck at the 16:07 mark and 40 seconds later Warwick tipped home Pete Leswick's pass to make it 4-3.

There was only a minute left in regulation time when the Islanders led the puck which called for a face-off in the Islanders end. Halifax drew their goalie and used the extra forwards. About five seconds after the face-off Johnny Morrow and Walt Pawlyshyn were battling for the puck when the disc struck Pawlyshyn's stick and slipped into the net.

The Islanders controlled play in the first over-time period although cutshot 4-2. With 30 seconds left in the period Willie Marshall drew goalie O'Hearn and slipped a pass across the goal mouth. Connie Bonhomme slapped off the puck but the disc went off the end of his stick and past the corner of the open net.

Outstanding Game
Ray Frederick again turned in an outstanding game for the Islanders. In the first two periods he turned aside 25 shots while allowing only one goal. Many of his stops were from point black range.

The Islanders forechecked the Saints in their own end and watched their wingers closely. The defence hit with authority and kept the Santamarians off balance for the first two and one half periods. Don Bellringer led the Islanders marksmen by scoring two goals. Bruno Favero and Denis Smith were the other scorers. Billy Ford scored the first goal for Halifax.

Favero scored the only goal of the first period when he followed up on a loose puck in the Halifax end. "Hub" Beaudry was checked at centre ice by the Halifax territory shot the puck into Halifax territory. Favero raced in to grab the rubber and scored on a 20 foot slap shot.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ICE MEET

Sir—I would like to draw attention in your newspaper to the rules concerning the Interscholastic Ice Meet held at Charlottetown Friday night, March 28, last.

First, I would like to ask why Cape Traverse is discriminated against?

Last year, at the ice meet Bob MacWilliams from Cape Traverse, aged 11, raced in the 11-year-old boys' race but fell and did not rank, therefore, he entered the 12-year-old race and won it, but was not given the cup on the grounds that he had entered in two races. This had not been stated in the rules sent out by the Department of Physical Fitness last year.

In 1950, Bob had also fallen in his own age group, but entered the next year's age group, won it and received the cup.

This year in the letter sent out to the schools, before the ice meet at Charlottetown, it definitely stated that no entrant could enter in more than one age group.

But this year Fred Bridges from Kensington ranked as second in the 11-year-old boys' race and also received the cup for ranking first in the 12-year-old race. Why should Kensington be able to do this, when definitely stated in the rules this year and last year when not stated, Bob MacWilliams from Cape Traverse was not given the cup?

Also this year, Bob MacWilliams came in with the boy who was ranked second, and who had picked up the corner mark and carried it to the next corner and Bob was not given even third place. Why?

Fred Bridges, according to the rules laid down this year and put in force last year, should have been disqualified instead of being given the cup.

I think, probably, that perhaps it is just another case of jealousy and not giving credit where it rightfully belongs, and deserving it.

Cape Traverse School had the smallest number of entries, and no rink for practice but patches of ice on the fields when the weather permitted, and as we all know, there was not too much favourable weather this winter.

In the letter sent out by the Physical Fitness Department it was also stated that cars taking entrants should receive \$5.00 a car.

The two cars taking the entrants in, had to be taken up to Carleton to the pavement last week when the road was frozen, as it is impossible by car now, and we had to go up by truck from Cape Traverse, and then were told that one car should have taken six entrants, the driver and a leader. Over these dangerous roads, two is all that can occupy the front seat and no one is going to pack six in the back seat over a long drive over the pavement in the broken condition it is.

Instead of the \$10.00 for the two cars, we were paid off with \$6.00 and told that there was no money left in the Department. No money for the country, I guess.

And finally, why was the East Prince Ice Meet not held at Borden this year as scheduled?

Mr. Reg. Rogers, Borden, hoping to have the ice meet at Charlottetown earlier this year, so that the country roads would not be muddy and impassable, put on

Red Wings Defeat Leafs 6-2 For 3rd Straight Victory

TORONTO, March 30 — (CP)—Detroit Red Wings, riding high on a power-laden front wall and a solid defence, plastered Toronto Maple Leafs 6-2 Saturday to take a three-game lead in their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-finals. The Wings should wrap it up Tuesday.

The National Hockey League champions, winners by 3-0 and 1-0 scores in the opening games at Detroit, showed the partisan crowd of 14,402 that why they are at least even money to take the series in four straight. They had too much all-round know-how for the Blue and Whites even without the injured Red Kelly, starry defence-man.

The Leafs sent chubby, 37-year-old Turk Broda into the nets and the overweight Turk, stale from inaction during the regular 70-game season and his reflexes dulled to a walk, couldn't cope with the free-wheeling Wings. He whiffed on a couple but he was given poor protection by the Toronto defence and the blame, if any, certainly wasn't his.

It wasn't the Broda of old. The beloved hero of Toronto fans who came out of Brandon, Mann, in the early '30s and caught on with the Leafs in the 1936-37 season, was in hot water most of the night. His clearing wasn't up to par and the Wings whipped in fast to snap up the rebounds and test the Turk again.

Nothing can be taken away from the Wings. The Production Line of Sid Able, Gordie Howe and Ted Lindsay set the pace and their two other lines gave them a high-powered threat for the 60 minutes.

Goalkeeper Terry Sawchuk, Vezina Trophy winner, backed up the

Detroit defence in big-league style and he was particularly brilliant in the third period when the desperate Leafs tried hard to make it a game. Sawchuk had 25 stops against Broda's 30.

Detroit's long passes repeatedly caught Leaf attackers in Red Wing territory, allowing them to skate in on the wobbly Toronto defence. Whether or not Broda goes back in again Tuesday night, he now has a formidable playoff record. His total of 101 Stanley Cup games is tops, 47 more than his closest active rival, Harry Lumley of Chicago who played in 54 cup games, all with Detroit.
