Hogan Favorite In U.S. Open

Hogan, now 45 and clinging to fading golf glory, has a burning desire to become the first man ever to win the Open five times. He was bitterly disappointed last year when a suddenly-lame back kept him from even starting in the championship.

SNEAD TRYING AGAIN

Many golfers think this is Ben's year to make it five—even though he has virtually retired from competition and admits that his golf, particularly the putting, isn't what it used to be. He has devoted months of tailoring his game to fit the Southern Hills course and has visited it several times for practice.

If Hogan isn't the man to beat,

it may be Sam Snead, who never has won the Open. Snead's booming shots are well suited to the 6,907-yard, par-70 course if he can make his putter behave.

But dissenting experts can point to almost any one of two or three dozen tested golfers who have shown they have the ability to win.

The field of 162 includes nine former champions, three of whom had to qualify regionally, many of the best performers on the professional tour, and challengers from Canada, Australia, South Africa and Mexico.

The last five individual winners don't have to qualify. Hogan won in 1948, 1950, 1951 and 1953.

Conn Smythe Colt Is Plate Winner

TORONTO (CP)—Caledon Beau, tough three-year-old campaigner from the Conn Smythe stable, ran away with the 99th running of the Queen's Plate classic Saturday before a well-heeled crowd of 28,386—a modern record—who gave Canadian racing its second million-dollar mutuels day in history.

The brown colt, by County De-light-seemly, labelled Canada's iron horse with its third start in eight days, including a Saturday-Monday back-to-back effort last weekend, easily outdistanced the 14-horse field to win by 9 1/2 lengths.

The victory gave Smythe, fiery boss of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, his first plate victory and a gross purse of \$26,395.

Caledon Beau covered the 1 1/4-mile distance in 2:04 1/5, compared with the plate record of 2:02 3/5 set by Layford Cay, winner of the 1957 stakes event. But he was out in front all alone for the final quarter mile and breezed home without urging from jockey Al Coy.

It was the three-year-old's sixth victory in 21 starts for total earnings of \$43,540. He returned \$7.80, \$4 and \$2.90.

Joe Carr Wins Golf Tourney

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (CP)—Jovial Joe Carr of Ireland, stroking calmly and often brilliantly, won the British amateur golf championship Saturday by defeating Alan Thirlwell of England 3 and 2.

Carr, a Dublin haberdasher who practised putts every morning before breakfast for the last year, dropped a 75-foot green shot on the 30th hole to put the match on ice.

The win was the second for Carr, 36. He capped the title in 1933, and has played on six British Isles Walker Cup teams.

Going into the afternoon round 1-up, Carr never lost the lead. He built it to a 2-up advantage, then watched Thirlwell, a 29-year-old Newcastle radio man, whittle it down to 1-up.
