Dry Air Slows Blight In Island Potato Crop

The weekly potato bulletin issued by the Research Laboratory in Charlottetown says the dry air that moved in over the Labor Day week-end has slowed down the late blight attack. It has also provided the growers with the opportunity to apply a fungicide against the next moist period. At this time in the growing season the yield per acre is increasing at a rapid rate. It is therefore important that the foliage be kept in as good health as possible so that the manufacture of starch may be maintained at a high level. Aphids are beginning to dis-

Evening Blood Donor Clinics Suggested For Rural Areas

NEW GLASGOW — The Junior Farmers of New Glasgow and District will approach the P.E.I. Division of the Red Cross to hold a blood donor clinic in the area next year in the evening. They believe the results would be worthwhile in a farming area such as New Glasgow. The decision to approach the Red Cross on this subject rose from a discussion held at the regular meeting on "Why blood donor clinics do not receive greater response." The discussion was led by the chairman of the organization's blood donor committee, and brought out several interesting points. Some of these facts were that: unwillingness to lower their resistance in the busy harvest season; holding the clinic on a fine day among many rainy days; an afternoon clinic being very inconvenient to many farmers; many do not appreciate the value of the free blood transfusion service operated by the Red Cross and P.E.I. hospitals, and in this connection it was noted that neither blood transfusions nor blood plasma was free in Montreal or in some centres in the United States. The members also pointed out that many other clinics in the province failed to receive as good a response this year as in former years. Larger Units Advocated For Education Grants

Glen Leese of Murray River was elected president of the Montague local teacher's federation at the annual convention held yesterday at Montague High School. Other executive members elected were First Vice-president, Eugene Murphy, Montague; Second Vice-president, Arthur MacNeill of Georgetown; and Secretary, Mrs. Grace Ross of Flat River. Highlighting the morning session of the one-day convention was the address by the outgoing president, Dan McCormack of Georgetown; a question and answer period by local supervisors H.J. Hynes and Louis Herring; and a talk on curriculum by Millar MacFadyen of the department of education. The afternoon session was addressed by Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, who dealt with curriculum and licenses. He urged the teachers to become informed of administrative matters and advocated the setting up of large board units to administration to which provincial grants could be made and teachers' salaries paid from the local unit level. Miss Anna Riley, secretary of the P.E.I. Teachers Federation, wished the new teachers success and reported, briefly on the activities of the federation at the provincial level. The retiring president, Mr. McCormack, welcomed the teachers, and with reference to the conference on education, urged them to study forthcoming changes in the educational system. An enthusiastic response and participation by the teachers was given to the question and answer period conducted by the local supervisor, Mr. MacFadyen who spoke on curriculum, also answered questions regarding the correction of grade ten examinations. The teachers then broke into groups to discuss teaching of phonics, what to do with the exceptional child, and proposed changes in the science text on which Mr. Driscoll spoke. The congratulations of the convention were extended to Mrs. Ross of Flat River and Mr. MacNeill of Georgetown for the excellent results obtained by their pupils in the grade ten examinations. Mrs. Devin of the Red Cross addressed the teachers on matters pertaining to Junior Red Cross. Committees appointed were: Press: J. Pineau and G. Leese; resolutions, A. MacNeill and L.
