Minister Indira Gandhi says she cannot see what India could do to help end the war in Viet Nam at the moment, but is playing a role toward both South and North Viet Nam which might permit India to assist in a later solution.

Mrs. Gandhi, in an exclusive interview, also said the food shortage in her nation of 400,000,000 people "is likely to worsen in a couple of months."

Of the rapprochement between India and Pakistan, negotiated recently at Tashkent, U.S.S.R., Mrs. Gandhi declared: "We are very sincerely and genuinely anxious to implement it in letter and spirit. We are doing all we can. It is too early to say it is going to work."

The prime minister, who departs for the United States in three weeks at the invitation of President Johnson, said the primary purpose of the trip "is to create better understanding between India's point of view on various issues and that of your president and your government."

Mrs. Gandhi commented upon Viet Nam in reply to two questions: "Is there any possibility of...

## Pope Adds Members To Commission

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul has added seven cardinals and seven bishops to his deadlocked birth control study commission in the hope of speeding conclusions on the issue of contraception.

Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani, the Vatican's leading conservative, was earlier named commission president and Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger of Montreal, a progressive, his deputy. "The work now will be more intense," said Rev. Henri de Riedmatten, Swiss theologian and commission secretary. The various currents in the church are now represented a little better.

He spoke at a press conference after the Vatican, breaking a long official silence about the workings of the commission, announced that Pope Paul named Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani as president of the commission and added 13 other prelates.

The commission was formed by the pontiff in June, 1964, to explore the entire subject of birth control and possibly, to recommend changes in the traditional teaching. The 57 members — theologians, psychologists, physicians, sociologists, married couples and others — have been reported for some time unable to come to a unanimous conclusion.

with the ace and played the queen of hearts at trick two. West took the heart with the ace and cashed the queen of diamonds, but there were then no more tricks for the defence. Actually, South could have made six hearts, if pressed. He could have finessed the jack of spades at trick two, cashed the ace, entered dummy with a club, and disposed of the jack of diamonds on the king of spades. His only loser would then have been a trump.

This would have been a foolish way to play the hand with the contract being five hearts, but at six hearts, South would have had to play that way. At the second table, the South player also got to five hearts, though on a different sequence of bids. But he went down one at this table when he made an error in the play. West led the king of diamonds, which dummed took with the ace. But now, instead of leading the queen of hearts, as the previous declarer had done, South played a low heart to the king. This play proved fatal when West took the king with the ace, cashed the queen of diamonds, and continued with the ten. East ruffed with the jack of hearts and South found himself down one.

## Wheat Carry-Over In U.S. Is Forecast At 12-Year Low

WASHINGTON (CP)—A wheat carry-over of perhaps less than 600,000 bushels — a 12-year low — is forecast by the United States agriculture department.

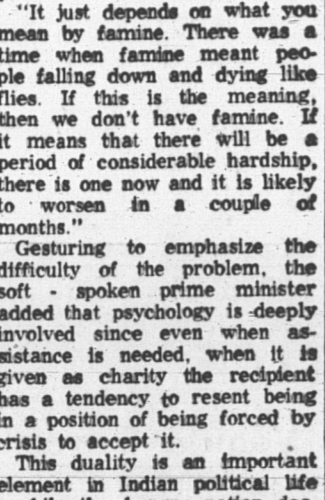
A heavy flow of Indian aid, higher commercial exports and increased domestic demand are credited with the forecast for the crop year ending next June 30. Exports and home consumption are expected to exceed the 1,400,000,000-bushel mark of the previous year, trimming the carry-over by between 185,000,000 and 225,000,000 bushels from the total of 818,000,000 bushels recorded then.

Stocks Jan. 1 totalled 1,339,000,000 bushels, eight per cent lower than a year before. Exports of wheat and flour for the six-month period ended Dec. 31 last totalled 530,000,000 bushels or 100,000,000 bushels more than the report coincides with big increases in shipments to India and pressure by the U.S. to get Canada, Australia, France, and Argentina to help food - short India more.

The report says commercial competition was a lot stronger a year ago but large sales to the Communist bloc by Canada and other countries have "to a limited extent" opened up additional free-world markets to U.S. wheat.

World trade in the year ending June 30 is expected to be a record volume exceeding 2,200,000,000 bushels, says the report. Communist purchases will be up by 300,000,000 bushels and the report says Communist countries now account for about one-third of wheat trading and more than half the commercially - sold wheat.

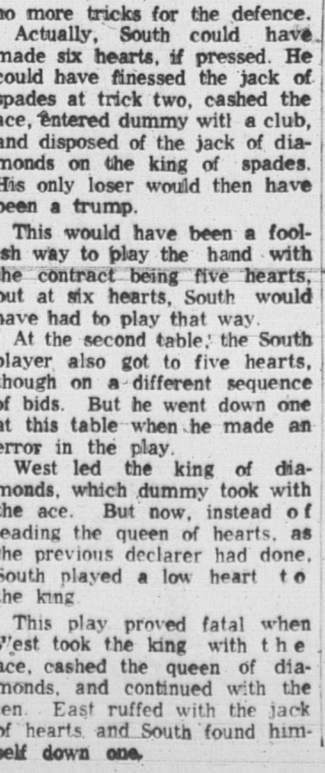
