Willison, the Canadian in question, (editor of the Globe), writes thus graphically of the subject:

"Cool and dispassionate thinkers believe that down among the people opinion is slowly shaping for a contest between the advocates of free trade on one hand and the advocates of a great alliance of free English-speaking democracies on the other hand, and that few have any adequate conception of the depth of feeling against the foreigner that is burning in the bosoms of great masses of Englishmen."

Mr. J. S. Willison can see clearly that Sir Charles Tupper's policy is the popular policy both here and in England.
