Montague C.W.L. Monthly Meeting

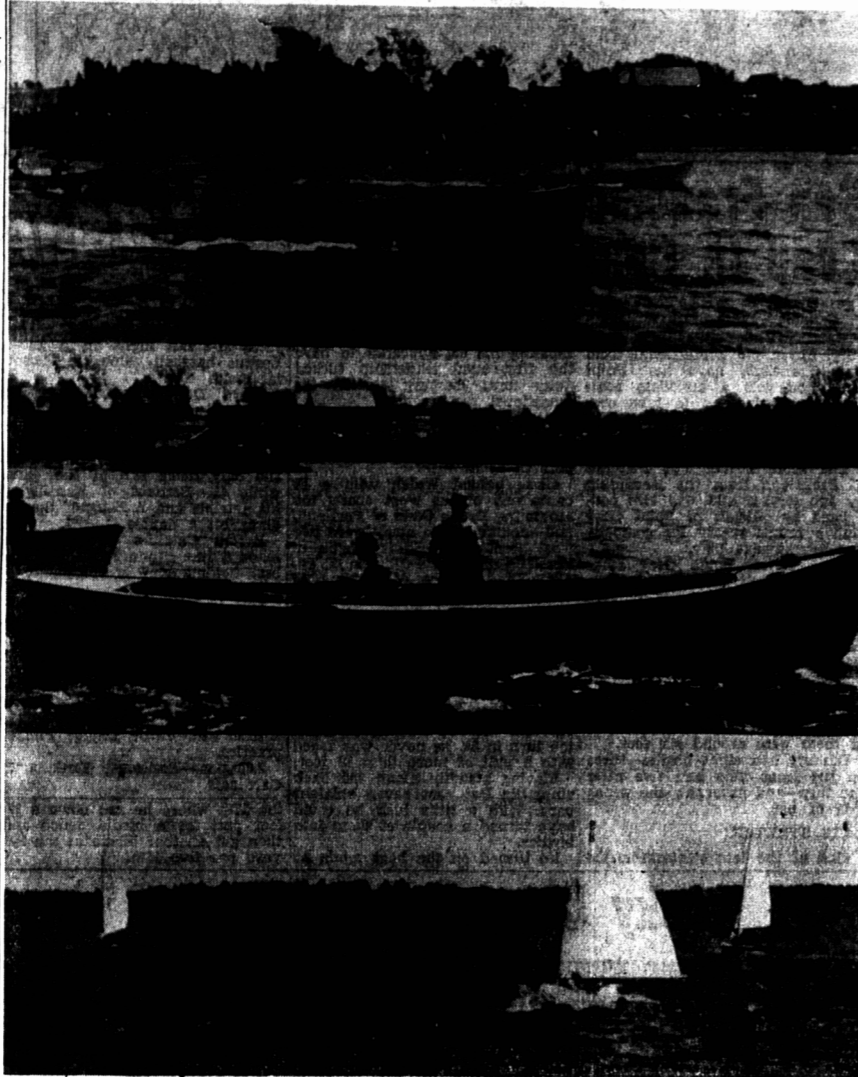
