

Anniversary Items.

MONDAY, Sept. 29—Michaelmas, the feast of St. Michael, the reputed guardian of the Roman Catholic Church under the title of "St. Michael and All Angels," instituted A. D. 487. The custom of eating goose at Michaelmas, is said to date from Sept. 29, 1888, when Queen Elizabeth partook of the bird at the house of Sir Neville Umfreyville, and at the same time heard of the destruction of the Spanish Armada, but the custom is of much older date, and is observed on the continent. St. Michael's Mount, in Cornwall, England, is where St. Michael was said to have appeared, anno, 710, which caused the place to be reputed holy. It became the seat of a body of monks, under a charter from Edward, the Confessor, anno, 1014, and obtained many privileges from Pope Gregory VII. anno, 1079.

SABBATH, a squaw, living near Upper Gagetown, brought 14 barrels of potatoes to this city yesterday, of her own cultivation.—St. John Sun. NEW YORK advices say that fine cheese has been stiff in price all through the past week, and not enough of it could be had to satisfy the demand. MR. R. J. ARMSTRONG, representative of R. Hy. Holland & Co., general dealers in fancy goods, Montreal, is making his regular business tour of the Province. He is at the Rankin. IT is understood that the heavy failure of Mr. Sawcutt, banker, of London, Ont., is attributed to indirect discounting and depression in the cattle trade. MR. C. H. SCHURMAN left this city to-day by morning train to attend the wedding of his brother Prof. J. G. Schurman of Dalhousie College, to Miss Munro, daughter of George Munro, Esq., of New York. THE funeral of Mrs. F. H. Beer took place this afternoon; and notwithstanding the very short notice was largely attended. Very great and general sympathy is felt for her bereaved husband and family. THE local authorities have been repairing the upper part of the Provincial Building, and are to be commended. Might we suggest that they now repair the lower part. The building, as it is at present, is not an example of thrift, carefulness, good taste, etc., though its surroundings are much improved. AN Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Witness says—"The plain intimations by Judges Strong and Ritchie against the validity of the McCarthy Act have raised the hope here that the jurisdiction question will be settled in favor of the Provinces without an appeal to the Privy Council."

A STRANGE DISAPPEARANCE.—The Shediac Monitor Accident is informed from a Fox Creek, Parish of Moncton, that Maurice D. LeBlanc has been missing for five weeks, and his family are without any information as to his whereabouts or the cause of his disappearance. He left his house on the 19th of July last, saying that he was going to Summerside to purchase a truck wagon. His relations with his wife, parents and neighbors were of the most pleasant and friendly character, and on going away he remarked that he would be back the next day or the day following. He never came back. Some suggest that he has gone to the United States, while others think some misfortune has overtaken him. Very naturally his family and friends are quite uneasy about him, and will be thankful for any information that will tend to explain his disappearance.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Successful Operations.

HANOI, Sept. 28. The French operations against Phany and Myluong have been successful. The French are now entirely masters of the situation along the river. To-day's Le Paris states that the government expects advices within a week that Admiral Courbet has occupied and fortified the heights commanding Keelong, on the Island of Formosa. This will be considered as a guarantee of greater value than the money indemnity demanded, and will enable France to await the fulfillment by China of the Tientsin treaty.

Wolsley to the Front. LONDON, Sept. 27. Advice received from Cairo to-night state that Gen. Wolsley has started for the front, but is still uncertain whether he really intends to attempt an expedition by boats to the Upper Nile. There is strong belief here that the camel corps will yet be utilized for the march up to Khartoum by way of Suakin and Berber.

A Series of Triumphs. LONDON, Sept. 28. Mr. Gladstone returned to Hawarden yesterday from his Scotch tour, which was a continuous series of triumphs. He was fatigued to-day, but expressed himself as delighted with his visits, and as confident that the House of Lords would recede from their hostility to the Franchise Bill.

An Explosion. LONDON, Sept. 28. An attempt was made to-day to blow up the Council Houses at Salisbury. A number of windows were smashed by the explosion, but otherwise no damage was done. No arrest. The Nationalist's meeting announced to be held at Balleymella to-day was suppressed by the police.

Nothing Fresh. CAIRO, Sept. 27. Additional letters have been received from Gen. Gordon, via Marsevah, but they contain no fresh intelligence.
