## Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—Early fractional advances in the industrial group witnessed at the close of light trading on the stock market Thursday.

The base metals scaled upward along a widespread front led by International Nickel, aluminum and noranda, each a point or more stronger.

A stronger trend prevailed in the pulp and paper group with International Paper up 3/4 points.

International Petroleum and B.A. oil, each a point higher, carried the senior oils upward. Algoma, ahead 2 points, was a standout in the steels. Declines maintained a slim margin over advances in the utilities. Banks and beverages were mixed and constructions followed a firmer path.

Mines were shaded in most instances, declines ranging to 15 cents in the lower-price metals and uranium.

## Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP)—The stock market made one of its strongest advances in more than three weeks today with base metals up more than four index points. But as prices moved ahead the pace of business slackened.

International Nickel, up 1/2, and Noranda, ahead 1/4, led the base metals to higher ground. Most of the metals' strength was in the seniors, Junior gains were limited to about 10 cents. Eureka, Openiska and Eastern Smelting lost 10-20 cents.

McIntyre, up \$1.50, and La Luz, \$3 better at \$3.10, led improved golds. Algoma gained a point among uranium but the group generally was easier. Lorado lost 1/4 at \$1.51 on a lively 121,000 shares.

Jersey itself gained 7/8 at 139 1/2, an amount that put an additional \$500,000 on to the quoted value of outstanding shares of the company's common stock.

The stock market as a whole disappointed frequently in key sections of played gains that ran from 1 to 3 1/2 the list and went on to around 5 points.

The best gainers of the day were found in steels, motors, radio-telvisions, non-ferrous metals, chemicals, railroads, oil and a long list of individual issues.

Standard Oil (N.J.) headed the most active list with 58,600 shares traded.

Chrysler was second up 2 at 96 1/2. Vision, meeting today for dividend action. United Merchants was third unchanged at 19.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained \$2.20 at \$171.00. It was boosted ahead by a gain of \$1.30 in rails and a gain of \$1.00 in utilities.

Among large gainers were Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Mack Trucks, Aluminum Ltd., Anaconda Co., Kennecott Copper, Du Pont and Allis Chalmers.

Canadian stocks were mostly higher. International Nickel advanced 1/2, McIntyre was up 3/4. Hiram Walker gained 1/2 and Canadian Pacific moved ahead 1/4. Dome Mines was unchanged and Distillers Seagram lost 1/4.

Royalite Oil gained 1/2 on the American exchange. Lake Shore was unchanged and Giant Yellowknife lost 1/8.
