MONDAY

Traffic on all highways in the Province was brought to a standstill shortly after four o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mr. S. H. Burhoe was elected president at the annual meeting of the Spring Park Community Club held in the hall on Friday evening.

Word has been received of the death of Mary Elizabeth 'Bessie' Campbell, beloved wife of Captain E. Boswell Allen, Vancouver, B.C., at the age of 43.

Capt. M. A. McTague, M.C., who recently returned to Canada after a year of active service in Korea, arrived in the city last evening by air to visit his parents.

A leadership banquet was held at the Y. M. C. A. Friday evening to honor 25 Physical Department leaders for the work they had done up until Christmas.

TUESDAY

The official opening of the Centennial Year at St. Dunstan's College will be observed this morning when Most Rev. Maurice Roy, Archbishop of Quebec City, celebrates a Pontifical High Mass in the College Chapel.

Sagr. Roy is Bishop of the oldest Catholic diocese in North America. He is also chancellor of Laval University, with which venerable institution St. Dunstan's College was affiliated for many years.

Twenty-five members of various Boy Scout Troops throughout the Province will assemble at Government House on Saturday, Feb. 6, to receive their Queen Scout Certificates at the hands of their Patron, Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse.

This will be the first formal presentation of such nature taking place here since 16 certificates were presented to Island Scouts by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth when visiting here in 1951 as Princess Elizabeth.

Government snow plows were able to get through all the main highways on the Island yesterday, however a steady ground drift which persisted during the day, had a tendency to fill in the cuttings and made travelling in places quite heavy.

Citizens last evening had an excellent opportunity to view a total eclipse of the moon between 10:17 and 10:47. The earth's shadow first began to show on the face of the moon at 6:40 and gradually covered the whole area.

Astronomers express concern when they talk about lunar eclipses. But they go into raptures when voicing their interest in another kind of eclipse—a total eclipse of the sun.

Sixty adult Chukkers from Nova Scotia will be brought to the Island and released as soon as advisable, according to arrangements being made by the executive of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association.

The new birds have been pen raised and will come to the Province under an exchange agreement whereby Nova Scotia is to receive a like number of Hungarian partridge from the Island.

By jamming the telephone circuits with calls of inquiry to the operator and the fire station whenever a fire alarm is sounded in Summerside, those citizens of the town are unwittingly creating a situation that completely disrupts certain parts of the telephone communication system in Summerside and prevents essential calls that frequently have to be made by or to the telephone operator, police and fire station.

Miss Clara Mountain, chief operator at the Summerside telephone exchange, in explaining the circuit problem created by inquiring telephone subscribers, said that from the moment the fire alarm is sounded, scores of people pick up their phone to try to find out where the fire is located.

The long record of achievement of Saint Dunstan's University was noted yesterday by Mr. Justice M. R. McGuigan of the Supreme Court when he addressed the large gathering at the auditorium as they opened the centennial celebration of the College.

Judge McGuigan recalled his personal association with the College and his years as a student there.

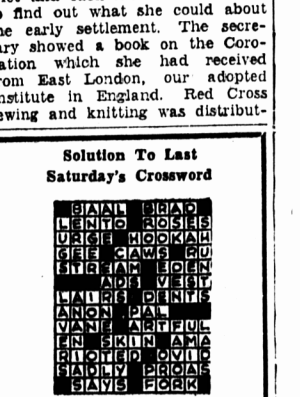
The January meeting of Success Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. J. M. Campbell on Jan. 13, with 14 members in attendance.

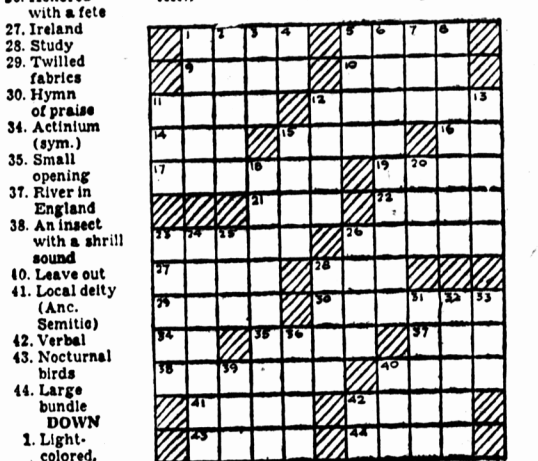
POSTMAN PATROL

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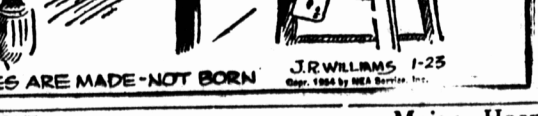
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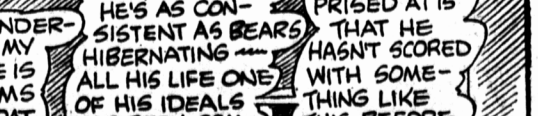
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
