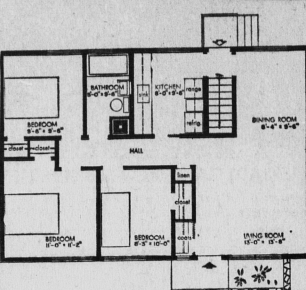


SIMPLICITY AND COMFORT feature this a m. l. three-bedroom house designed by architect M. G. Dixon of Ottawa.

Although under 900 square feet in floor area, the house offers convenient living, sleeping and living quarters a rare separate while the living room and dining room arrangement provides a large open family area. The rear door gives ready access to the kitchen and basement.

FIRST AID FOR THE HOME

BY ROGER C. WHITMAN REMOVING GLUE

QUESTION: I put masking tape on my windows when I painted them. Later when I pulled the paper off, the glue remained. How can I get the glue off the glass?

ANSWER: A razor blade, used carefully to avoid scratching the glass, is often successful. Try a damp sponge for removing the glue. If not successful, soften the glue with nail-polish remover, being careful to keep the remover away from the painted surfaces.

BEFORE PAINTING

QUESTION: I am a new home owner on a budget, and I would like to paint an antique table and two old chairs which were given to me. I have already removed all the finish with paint remover, but first I would like to know to which white should be used when I apply the paint? I want to do a good job, even though I am "green" at painting.

ANSWER: First apply a prime coat which is usually the paint thinned down about 25 per cent with turpentine (if oil base paint) or with water for water-mixed paints). If you are planning to use enamel, use enamel undercoater. Next, fill any dents, cracks and nail holes, using wood filler, plastic wood or spackling compound. Incidentally, for out-door painting, this job is done with putty over which is applied a dab of shellac. Level the filler carefully so the entire surface is smooth. When the filler has dried, proceed with the painting.

TV NOISY

QUESTION: Our 8 children's bedroom is directly over our TV room and it keeps them awake. My husband is quite hard of hearing, so it's impossible to turn the volume down to soundproof. Is there any way to soundproof our ceiling?

ANSWER: There is. But before going to the trouble and expense, you may not have an adjustment made on the set so that you could use individual accessories? Acoustical sound-absorbing tiles can easily be laid on the ceiling which will absorb sounds to a considerable degree. Installation is a simple, do-it-yourself project. Your

WHITE CEDAR PANELING

QUESTION: What is the proper way to finish white cedar paneling?

ANSWER: I recommend using a penetrating finish available at lumber-finishing dealers. It leaves a soft, wax finish, easy to care for. Follow manufacturer's instructions for applying. Other good methods are top quality varnish or pure, fresh white shellac, followed by waxing. Still others are available in many books on wood finishing.

RUSTED ANDIRONS

QUESTION: While cleaning, I was surprised to find our andirons and fire basket are very rusty. Is there any way I could paint them?

ANSWER: I assume they are of wrought iron. Rub the rust spots with turpentine and steel wool, or remove with rust-removing preparation now available at most paint and hardware stores, following label instructions. Remove all old surface paint with paint remover. Clean with turpentine and refinish with flat black enamel.

FIREPLACE CHIMNEY

QUESTION: We are building an addition to our house and want to include a fireplace. How is the height of the chimney calculated?

ANSWER: A chimney in order to have a free draft, should be not less than 4 feet higher than a flat roof or 3 feet higher than the highest point of a gable roof. Be sure the fire is the same size to the top.

MARBLE SCRATCH REMOVER

QUESTION: What is used to remove minor scratches and stains from marble?

ANSWER: Wash marble with clean cloths and fresh lukewarm water; twice a year use a mild detergent. This will take care of minor stains. For scratches, use putty powder (oxide of tin), available at marble yards. It is applied with a damp felt pad and plenty of elbow grease. For polishing and surface protection, you can wax the surface; for marble, be extremely careful to get a wax which will not turn yellow.
