"The Chinese are masters in unusual food combinations," observed the Chef. "Theirs was the first cuisine to combine fresh or smoked pork with shellfish in soups, wonton dumplings and egg rolls."

"Since the days of the Caesars, Rome and now all Italy favors the combination of veal steak rolls stuffed with tuna."

"In colonial days in our country, Chef," I added, "anchovies were used to season veal ragouts and to top veal cutlets."

"Scallops were broiled with smoked bacon; clams were 'stuffed,' topped with bacon Casino-style and broiled; and good-sized oysters were broiled with bacon and vegetables on brochettes."

"As the famous Creole cuisine developed in Louisiana, a rice jambalaya included both shrimp and smoked ham."

"Chicken with oysters" "Came the turn of the century in New York City and fashionable restaurants served a famous chafing dish specialty—chicken with oysters in a rice cream-vegetable sauce."

"And as our interest in international foods developed, Madame," interrupted the Chef, "chicken paella from south of the border was introduced in Spanish and Mexican restaurants. In addition to chicken and shrimp, it also used clams or mussels, and sometimes crab meat."

**LOBSTER-CHICKEN BROCHETTES**  
3-lb. broiler-fryer chicken, split  
2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
6 tsp. olive oil  
6 small frozen rock lobster tails  
3 large green peppers  
1 tsp. paprika  
Wash and dry chicken. Season with 1 tsp. salt and the pepper. Slow-saute in 4 tsp. olive oil until lightly browned. Cool. Cut chicken meat from bones into 1 1/2" squares. Meantime, boil lobster tails

OTTAWA (CP) — Twenty-six Canadian art collectors have loaned some of their priceless paintings to the National Gallery for a special show of European art in Canada.

The exhibition, entitled from Corot to Picasso, opened Thursday until March 4. It will not be shown in any other Canadian city.

The show is considered significant because it displays the range of European art acquired by collectors, both public and private, in Canada.

1/4 tsp. ginger  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
1-16 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. butter or margarine. Wash cranberries. Turn into 2-qt. saucepan. Add vinegar and water. Simmer-cook 5 min. or until soft. Rub through sieve or buzz in blender.  
Add brown sugar and seasonings. Simmer 3 min. or until beginning to thicken. Stir in butter or margarine.
