WANTON ATTACK British Foreign Secretary Eden told the House of Commons Tuesday Britain was forwarding to Peiping the U. S. protest against the "wanton" attack on U. S. navy planes. The U. S. note also protested the death or injuries to six U. S. citizens aboard the attacked British airliner.

Britain relayed the American protest because the United States has no diplomatic representation in Peiping.

A new air incident off Hainan Tuesday brought restrained comment from Eden. The pilot of a French airliner reported in Hong Kong he had been "buzzed" by four jet fighters "in shape and color" of Soviet-built MiGs while flying about 75 miles off Hainan.

MIG FIGHTERS Eden pointed out that the pilot claimed the four planes appeared to fly close to his plane for identification purposes. The pilot had been interrogated later by RAF authorities, Eden said, and they were "satisfied the fighters were MiGs."

Because of the "sky jitters" around Hainan, RAF and commercial planes are giving the island a wide berth. The air ministry announced Tuesday night all RAF transport planes flying between Singapore and Hong Kong have been rerouted to steer clear of Hainan.

Earlier, the British Overseas Airways Corporation announced its airliners would fly "substantially further south" of the Communist island. Hainan lies about 300 miles southwest of Hong Kong of the route to Singapore.

LASHED AT REPLY In his Commons statement, Eden lashed out at the Communist reply from Canton to Hong Kong air authorities about sending search planes into the crash area.

"A message was received from Canton air traffic control that a Sunderland aircraft already in the area would be permitted to remain," Eden said, "but that any other war planes sent to search would be fired on without warning if they approached land."

"This message was entirely against all international customs and behavior. The British representative has been instructed to make a protest at Peiping in respect of this message."

and that two rifles of different calibres could be the weapons.

Questioned regarding marks on the bones of the younger Lindsey when they were found, Rousset said "loss of substance on some of the bones could have been caused by a bullet but could also be the result of gnawing by animals."

In other words, you cannot say that marks on the bones of Richard Lindsey were made by a projectile from a rifle," Maher asked.

"That is correct," Rousset replied.

CLOTHING STUDIED Rousset also stated under cross-examination that his conclusions regarding the shooting of the younger Lindsey were based on investigation of clothing he allegedly wore.

He had examined a woollen shirt, a green cotton shirt and a blood-stained white sweatshirt, each pierced by a bullet over the heart, Bernard Pelet, Rousset's 26-year-old assistant, gave a chemical description of bullets used in 32.40 calibre rifles, saying they are the only ones that do not contain potassium in the powder.

He said an examination of lead species on the rifle butt and on Lindsey's clothes showed no potassium content, indicating the bullet was from a 32.40 Marlin rifle.

Maher asked whether it was possible that the bullets hitting the clothes did contain some potassium but that the chemical substance did not appear on the clothes. Pelet said this was "very possible."

Uneasy Truce Settles Over North Viet Nam

HANOI, Indo-China (AP) — An uneasy truce settled over North Viet Nam Tuesday.

The Communist-led Vietminh continued attacking a French garrison at Chi Diem, 37 miles northeast of Hanoi. Ten persons were reported killed when the patrol was ambushed between Hanoi and Hai Phong.

The French made strong protests regarding both incidents to the Vietminh, who called them "regrettable errors."

The Vietminh had harassed Viet Namese-manned posts in the Red river delta throughout the night and up to the time the cease-fire became effective.

Fighting in the delta officially halted seven years, seven months, and seven days after the Moscow-trained Ho Chi Minh staged the first Vietminh attack on Hanoi Dec. 19, 1946. Estimated casualties range between 700,000 and 1,000,000.

Crash-Lands First Delta Wing Plane

FARNBOROUGH, Eng. (Reuters)—The four-jet Avro Vulcan, Britain's first delta-wing bomber, was crash-landed here Tuesday night by its pilot. There was only superficial damage to the plane, and both pilot Roland Falk and his co-pilot, W. Potocki, escaped unhurt.

Senators Approve Atomic Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bore weary senators approved President Eisenhower's sweeping atomic energy program, with some basic changes, Tuesday night on the 13th day of a hot debate. The vote was 57 to 28.

It approved an omnibus measure opening the atomic field to private industry and authorizing the President to reveal some nuclear secrets to foreign allies.

Work Proceeds On Montague Wharf

The new wharf at Montague on which the new storage shed is to be erected, is rapidly going ahead. The facing has been completed, and includes fourteen piles, 10 by 10 walings and four inch sheathing on the inside. It is being designed to permit the erection of the wharf, and allow complete usage of the west end of the government wharf, which hitherto, because it was so narrow, has been almost unusable.

To complete the wharf facing, bagged cement will be placed between the facing and the old crib work, and over all this a cement slab will be run, using also steel rods to tie in the new wharf.

On this cement slab, which will be insulated against dampness, the new shed will be erected. The building will be 80 feet long and over 30 feet wide, with trussed roof to give a completely clear floor space. There will be a sliding door on the west side, and two similar ones on the east side.

The frame construction will be covered with plywood, further covered on the roof with heavy asphalt shingles, and on the walls with corrugated asbestos. The shed will be used for storage purposes. Mr. Henry Munroe and his crew are pushing the work rapidly forward, so that the construction of the building may get underway.
