The states of Florida, Georgia and Virginia spread out

of luxury, Formosa's feel of the Orient.
Czechoslovakia, an old and well-known exhibitor, has her usual wide range. Japan is the year's sophisticate—content to project an image of Japan and showing hardly any products except a Datsun automobile. Sweden is any year's sophisticate, reflecting her highly-developed industry and science.

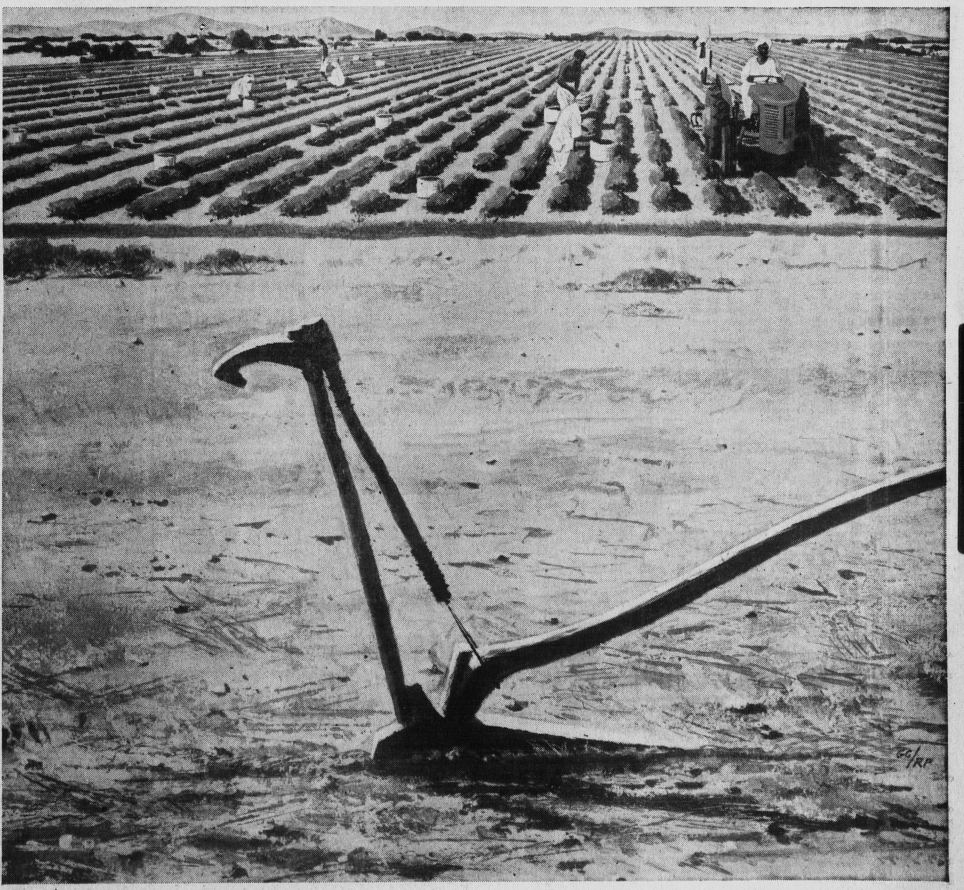
