Special Service At Cascumpec United Church

Rev. L. S. Godfrey, B.A. D.D., Superintendent of Home Missions in the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada and a former minister of the Alberton Anglican Church, was guest preacher at Cascumpec Church Sunday morning as anniversary services of the congregation were continued from a previous Sunday. The service was conducted by the minister, Rev. Arthur R. Wallis, B.A., and an augmented choir sang "Have Thine Own Way, Lord."

Rev. Dr. Godfrey's message on the work of the church came forth from the great fund of knowledge he has gained as superintendent of Home Missions. He stated that the Home Mission Board of the United Church of Canada administers one million dollars a year in sixteen different projects, every one of which is designed to make Canada Christian. The church has approximately three thousand pastoral charges, one third of which receive aid in the supply of ministers and, in addition two hundred student ministers serve many outlying districts during the summer months. During the past ten years membership in the United Church has increased thirty percent, while in the same period the national increase in population has been twenty-one percent, according to the last census. Since it is the largest Protestant Church in the Dominion, this lays upon the United Church a tremendous responsibility to give spiritual leadership.

Other activities on the Church in Canada include hospitals, schools, Indian work, institutional work, marine missions, the work of port chaplains and others who work among immigrants especially non-Anglo-Saxons. There is also church extension work which calls for the building at once of hundreds of new churches.

Preparations Well Underway For Musical Festival

The conveners of the South Shore Musical Festival committees met at the home of Mrs. Wm. A. Jones, Tryon, on Wednesday evening, to report to the executive how plans for the festival, which is being held on the 7th and 8th of this month, were progressing. Because of the inclement weather, some of the conveners were unable to attend, but reports from all were read, when called for by the president, Mrs. Arthur MacKay.

The hall committee convenor, Mrs. Eric R. MacMurdo, reported that the preliminary competitions on Saturday would be held in the High School, elocution in the library, and music in the music room. However, Friday's preliminary competition is to be held in the Baptist Hall, Church Street. The entertainment committee convenor, Miss Phyllis Britten, announced that, this year, the children would be able to take their lunches to the Baptist Hall, on Church St., at noon on Saturday, where there are every kind of kitchen and dining-room facilities.
