CWL Activities Reviewed At Annual Meeting

Following is the report of Mrs. Frederick J. Steele, recording secretary of the Charlottetown sub-division of the Catholic Women's League, given at the annual meeting of the organization Tuesday night.

Madam President, Reverend Chaplain and members of the C. W. L.:

At this annual meeting of our sub-division it is my privilege to present a summary of the different activities of the Charlottetown sub-division, from April 1950 to April 1951.

During the term there were nine regular, ten executive and two special executive meetings held.

In July the members were privileged to attend a Diocesan Retreat at Notre Dame Academy, preached by Reverend David Edwards, C.Ss.R.

On Nov. 5th a Communion Mass was held at the Queen Hotel, following Mass at 8 o'clock at the Basilica. 86 members attended.

On Remembrance Day a Requiem Mass was offered in the Basilica by the C.W.L. and the K. of C. for those who made the supreme sacrifice and a wreath was placed at the cenotaph by Mrs. Lorne Noonan and Mrs. P. J. Nealis representing the sub-division.

Mrs. Lorne Noonan, President, attended the National Convention held in Halifax in October, as a representative of the sub-division.

Flowers were sent to the Basilica and Holy Redeemer Church at Christmas and Easter.

All National and Diocesan fees and voluntary donations to National objectives have been paid.

During the year contributions were made to—Catholic Girls' Scholarship Fund, Social Welfare, T.B. League, Missionaries of Mary, Christmas Charities, Girl Guides, Dispensary, Children's Aid Society, St. Vincent's Orphanage, Provincial Sanatorium, City Hospital Bazaar, Red Cross, March of Dimes, Play Ground Commission, Musical Festival Association, St. Martha Building Fund.

Funds were raised to carry on the work of the sub-division through pantry sales, rummage sales, commission on sale of Pope's picture, private card parties and a tag day.

The total finances of the year were reported by the Treasurer, Miss Evangeline Vessey.

Special speakers during the year were Rev. J. W. McCardie, Rev. Alexander McLellan, Rector of Holy Redeemer Parish and Mrs. James Pendergast, Provincial President.

The appreciation of the sub-division is extended to our Chaplain, Rev. J. W. McCardie and Rev. P. F. MacDonald who by their faithful attendance and encouraging words have been an incentive and inspiration to our members. Thanks goes also to Miss Marion Dougan who played at the opening and closing of our meetings each month.

The sub-division extends sincere sympathy to members who have been bereaved during the past year.

In conclusion I wish to express my thanks to our President, Mrs. Noonan, and members of the sub-division for courtesy extended.

Convener's Reports

The following reports of the different Convener's briefly summarize the year's work:

All correspondence and notices of all meetings were attended to by the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. E. J. McTague. During the year 75 letters were received and "get well" cards were sent to our sick members. 13 Mass Cards were sent to bereaved members and offerings for High Masses made on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee of Rev. P. McMahon, on Remembrance Day and for the living members on the Feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel.

The Convener, Mrs. P. J. Nealis reports progress along educational lines. The usual prizes were presented to St. Dunstan's University and the amount to our City schools raised to \$500. The sub-division also donated \$100.00 to the Catholic Girls' Scholarship Fund and prizes for Christian Doctrine were donated by junior and senior classes in both parishes.

Mrs. Frank Murray, press convener, has given due publicity to the work done by the sub-division during the year. This included reporting nine monthly meetings to the press—Guardian and Patriot, all advertising of League activities including cake sales, tag day and rummage sales, also notices for prayers for bereaved members. The convener extends sincere appreciation to the press for courtesy.

The principal activity of the year was the Provincial Convention which was held in Charlottetown in August. The convention banquet was held at the Queen Hotel and afternoon tea at Government House. After our monthly meetings a social hour was enjoyed by our members with a picture on one occasion being shown by Mr. Stanley McInnis of the National Film Board. The Convener, Miss Marion Dougan extends thanks to the following speakers who gave of their time and talent to make our meetings interesting, Rev. J. W. McCardie, Rev. A. McLellan, C.Ss.R., and Mrs. James Pendergast. These talks were much appreciated by the members.

Mrs. Catherine Creamer, the convener, reports caring for the list of books posted in the vestibule of the Basilica. Several times during the year the list was dust-

ed and covered with new cellophane. Arrangements were made with Mr. James Hennessey to have new frames with glass cover made to cover the list and it is hoped this will be done this month.

Mrs. Peter LeClair, as convener has been faithful in visiting members who were ill and "get well" cards were sent to help cheer patients.

Mrs. J. H. Blanchard, convener, reports 11 new members this year bringing our total membership to 152. During the year three of our members passed away.

Through the efforts of the convener, Mrs. A. T. MacKinnon, \$35.00 was collected. Three new subscriptions to the "Canadian League" magazine were obtained.

The annual Diocesan Retreat was held at Notre Dame Academy in July with several of our members in attendance. The retreat was conducted by Rev. David Edwards, C.Ss.R. On Nov. 5th a Communion Breakfast was held at the Queen Hotel with 86 members present. The convener, Mrs. C. L. MacDonald reports visits made to four homes where the Rosary was said and 11 Mass Cards sent to bereaved members. A large number of our members took part in the Corpus Christi Procession and several ladies attended to the "Hour of Adoration" on First Fridays.

Girl Guides

That great interest is taken in the work of guiding is shown by the report of Mrs. Arthur Murray, convener. The 8th Company Basilica Girl Guides with an enrollment of 39 guides is under the leadership of Captain Elaine MacDonald and Lieutenant Ena Marjorie Murphy. Meetings are held in the C.W.L. hall. In August 11 Guides attended camp at Rustico with Rev. Owen Sharkey as Chaplain. Guides had the privilege of attending Holy Mass each morning and prayers in the evening. They were also able to attend the Eucharist Congress held at North Rustico. There is also a company of guides at St. Vincent's Orphanage with Miss Christine Moysiakha, a student at St. Dunstan's as captain. In March, 26 Brownies were enrolled by Mrs. Gordon MacDonald, bringing the total enrollment to 30 Brownies under Brown Owl Janet MacDonald. In November a "Scroll of Friendship and Log Book" made by British Girl Guides was on display here. The Guides of P.E.I. are now making a "Scroll of Friendship" in which the 8th Company have a page, which they will send to Girl Guides in England. Other activities during the year included pantry sale, candy sale, parties, rally and enrollment, 16 Guides being enrolled in November, and courses in child nursing, cooking and religion.

Institutions

During Sanatorium Week a committee of ladies from the sub-division visited the Sanatorium and delivered a gift of candy, magazines, and a vase of flowers to each patient. These gifts were greatly appreciated. The convener, Mrs. W. J. P. MacMillan was assisted in this work by Mrs. Lorne Noonan, President, Mrs. Catherine Creamer and Miss Gertrude Coady. At Christmas a large amount of fruit, candy and cookies were delivered to the patients in the Infirmary, Sacred Heart Home and to the Precious Blood Monastery, as well as private donations from the members of the sub-division. A quantity of clothing, knitted goods and toys was sent to St. Vincent's Orphanage. Each week magazines and Catholic papers were distributed at the Sanatorium and Sacred Heart Home. Mrs. MacMillan extends thanks to all who helped her carry on this work.

The convener, Mrs. J. L. McGuigan reports funds raised to carry on the work of the sub-division through three cake sales, two rummage sales, tag day, commission on sale of Pope's picture and individual card parties.

Mrs. E. J. MacDonald, convener, reports 32 members of the sub-division in Blue Cross group. Each quarter the fees are collected and forwarded to headquarters in Moncton. The amount collected by Mrs. MacDonald was \$475.00.

The motto of the League "For God and Canada" is exemplified in the willingness of our members to co-operate with other agencies in anything tending to promote good citizenship. Many of the members assisted in the drive for funds sponsored by the Red Cross and Children's Aid Society. The sub-division has representation on the following organizations—Social Welfare Bureau, Red Cross, Free Dispensary, T.B. League, Play Grounds Commission, Children's Aid Society, New Canadian Citizenship Council, Provincial and Local Association Girl Guides, and it is hoped we will be represented on the Musical Festival Association after their next annual meeting. The convener, Mrs. Parnell McMahon reports all public meetings have been attended by representatives from the society and all members are vigilant in the type of movies shown in our theatres and the reading matter displayed in our book stores. It is the duty of every good citizen to check the evil influences so prevalent in our midst today.

Social Service

The convener, Mrs. Stephen Trainer reports the members of her committee met weekly at the Catholic Welfare Bureau rooms during the year. The following work was accomplished—350

children's and infants garments made, 62 knitted articles for infants and children. A large number of quilts, bed comforters, and baby blankets made. Clothing for adults was pressed, repaired and made ready for distribution to needy families. Several cartons of clothing were packed and sent to country parishes. 25 articles of clothing were sent to the fire victims and a donation of \$10.00 was also sent from the sub-division to relieve these needy families. Large donations of clothing were received from the members and the sum of \$34.00 was donated by the sub-division to aid social service work.
