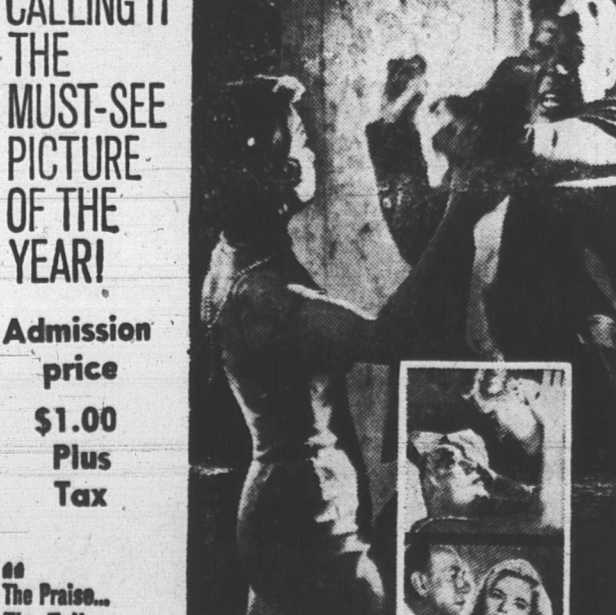
David LeRoy Kelly, city charged with failing to stop at a stop sign, was fined \$5 and costs for two days.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

P.E.I. Canadian Club Has Lined Up Speakers

The Canadian Club of Prince Edward Island has launched its membership drive for the 1966-67 season and a fine array of outstanding speakers has been lined up for the meetings scheduled from Sept. 22 to May 2.

Arnold Peters, MP for Timiskaming, Ont., will be the first of six distinguished visitors to appear here under the Canadian Club auspices.

Mr. Peters has a long career as organizer for the International Woodworkers of America. He is a former member of the RCAP and is active in Canadian Legion work. He has been in the House of Commons since 1957. A member of the New Democratic Party, he is a colorful parliamentarian and a controversial public speaker.

On Oct. 25, it will be Douglas Wilkinson, author, film director and expert on the Eskimo. Dr. J.D. Griffin will follow on Nov. 22. Dr. Griffin has been associated with the Canadian Mental Health Association since 1936. He has been general director since 1952.

CANADIAN ARCTIC

On Jan. 17, 1967, Supt. W.G. Fraser will be the guest speaker. Supt. Fraser was until recently, officer commanding the 1st division of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. This division was responsible for policing the entire Canadian Arctic.

The Canadian Club of Prince Edward Island is most desirous of retaining all of last season's members as well as gaining new ones.

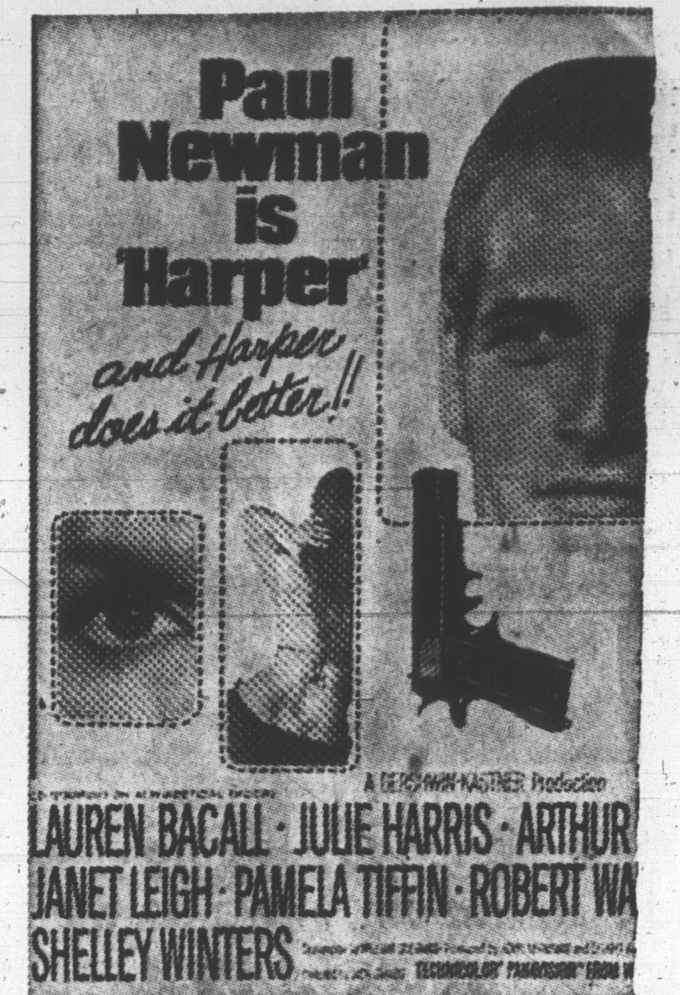

Douglas Wilkinson

Douglas Wilkinson is an author, film director, Arctic adventurer, and top expert on the Eskimo. He has been extremely popular as a Canadian Club speaker.

He is author of "The Land of the Long Day" and contributor to MacLean's and the Beaver. He has frequently appeared on CBC-TV programs. A new book of his, for children, is about to be published by Clarke Irwin.

He has spent considerable time filming Eskimo life and hunting in the High Arctic Islands.

He lived for a year as the adopted son of an Eskimo family, learned the language and how to be an Eskimo hunter.



NOVEMBER 22nd
Dr. J. D. Griffin

Dr. Griffin graduated in arts and medicine, University of Toronto, later doing postgraduate work in psychology and psychiatry at Toronto, in the United States and in England.

He has been associated with the Canadian Mental Health Association since 1936—and as General Director, succeeding Dr. Clarence Hincks, 1952—to date.

He frequently is consultant on the mental health and human relations programs of the C.B.C.; former lecturer at the school of Social Work and Department of Psychology, University of Toronto.



JANUARY 17th
Supt. W. G. Fraser

Supt. Fraser till recently was the Officer Commanding "G" Division of the R.C.M. Police, the Division responsible for the policing of the entire Canadian Arctic which includes the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory.

Supt. Fraser joined the R.C.M. Police in the summer of 1931 and upon conclusion of recruit training was immediately posted to the Eastern Arctic where during that service he was one of the search parties who went out seeking the whereabouts of the lost German Expedition.

During 1944, Supt. Fraser, was detailed as personal bodyguard for Sir Winston Churchill at the Second Quebec Conference with Mr. Roosevelt.



MARCH 17th
Merrill Denison

Canada's foremost business historian Merrill Denison sandwiched service in both the French and American armies in World War I between his architectural studies at the University of Toronto, Pennsylvania, Columbia U and the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. He quit architecture after a year to become art director of the Hart House theatre.

One of his stage plays, Brothers in Arms, is still bringing in royalties today 45 years after it was written, and a radio play of his, On Christmas Night, was the curtain raiser for the first Metropolitan Opera broadcast ever made by NBC.



MAY 2nd
Miss M. L. Lynch

Miss Lynch has had varied and extensive experience in law and was the first woman to argue a case in the New Brunswick Court of Appeal. Miss Lynch has for some years handled various legal and financial matters for Lord Beaverbrook.

Miss Lynch was Secretary and Registrar of the Faculty of Law at the University of New Brunswick from 1948 until the Faculty of Law was moved from Saint John to Fredericton in September 1959. In 1954 Miss Lynch was appointed to the Senate of the University of New Brunswick.
