3rd Prince Road Paving Outlined

This year's road building program for Third District Prince was announced yesterday by Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge and Keith Harrington, M.L.A., after consultation with Highways Minister Philip Matheson and Dr. Orville Phillips, PC candidate for Prince.

25 MILES FOR PAVING

About 25 miles of road is scheduled for paving. Projects are: Abrams Village to Egmont Bay Church; Irishtown Road to Dunrovin; Belmont, Lot 16, one mile; Spring Valley, starting at present pavement, one mile; Malpeque to Cove, two miles; parking strip at Roman Catholic Church, Indian River; parking strip at church at Malpeque; Bayside Road turn to Arlington; and Cosgoes Road at Wellington.

to bridge work in the district, as the program has been delayed because of recent damage to many bridges in the province which will have to be rebuilt before any projects are approved for this season. Snow trap removal in the district will also be delayed for the same reason. Two parks are also contemplated for the coming season in the district; two water conservation projects are also contemplated.

According to Dr. Phillips, there will be "considerable" extensive improvements to Malpeque Wharf this year.

BURNING CREOSOTE TIMBERS CAUSE SMOKE

Smoke Is Heavy But Loss Is Light

Fire caused an estimated \$200 or \$300 damage to a CNR stockpile of creosoted lumber on railway property in Charlottetown yesterday morning. The blaze sent billows of heavy, black smoke pouring along the waterfront. E.C. Taylor, CNR superintendent, said last night that the fire did not cause heavy damage but just burned the creosote of the lumber. The lumber can still be used, he said. Mr. Taylor corrected an early report that stated the fire started when grass carried flames from a nearby inciner-

ators to the piles of telegraph poles and bridge planking. He said that the incinerator had not been used for a long time. He expressed the opinion that the fire could have been started from a carelessly thrown cigarette butt which ignited the grass. A steel box car near the area when the blaze broke out was removed before it was damaged. The heavy pall of smoke drew hundreds to the scene and at times traffic was kept moving with difficulty.

Abattoir Group To Meet Gov't

It has been indicated that the company representatives will seek compensation for alleged losses sustained by the company because of the refusal of a government loan of \$50,000 that was provided for by order-in-council. It has also been indicated that the government will be asked to build and equip a killing and processing plant for livestock. Estimated cost of the plant runs between \$250,000 and \$300,000.

HOPE TO LURE BRITONS

Governor Extols Island As Resort

LONDON — Led by Hon. F. Walter Hyndman, Lieut-Governor of P.E. Island, a delegation of 67 business men and industrialists from the Atlantic Provinces of Canada is spending two weeks in Britain. Their chief aim is to conduct a business mission in the interest of greater trade and business relations between the United Kingdom and the Atlantic Provinces. They are representative of 120 Chambers of Commerce in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

During their two weeks' stay in Britain, they will visit different parts of the country, according to their varied interests. Their tour has been arranged by H. Watson Jam-

es, Agent-General in London for the Atlantic Provinces. Said Mr. Jamieson, who was host at a reception tendered to them on their arrival in the Sir John A. Macdonald building on Grosvenor Square: "They are not here to talk Common Market, but Commonwealth Market. This is a straight buying and selling mission."

Secretary of the mission is Alfred Parkes, of Moncton, New Brunswick. "Millions of pounds worth of business could result from this effort" was his comment as he met some British business men at the reception. Everett Rooney, also of Moncton said that unlike previous trade delegations, the Maritimers would not travel around the United Kingdom in a body or in groups. Parties of two or three, or even individuals, representing particular lines of business, would make a man-to-man approach to their counterparts in Britain, and discuss business on a more personalized basis than is usual with trade missions. Lester Des Brisay, Secretary - Treasurer of the Province of New Brunswick Chamber of Commerce, said he hoped to see more British factories in Eastern Canada. "In some provinces," he said, "we build the factory and practically give it away if only you will come over and bring your British key men with you."

The 67 Canadians, many of whom brought their wives with them, travelled in a chartered Trans-Canada jet airliner accommodating 127 people. Their arrival in Britain was not allowed to go unnoticed. Lord Beaverbrook saw to that. On the day they landed at London airport, the Daily Express carried a special four-page supplement devoted to stories and pictures of life and industry in the Canadian Atlantic Provinces.

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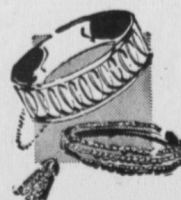
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
