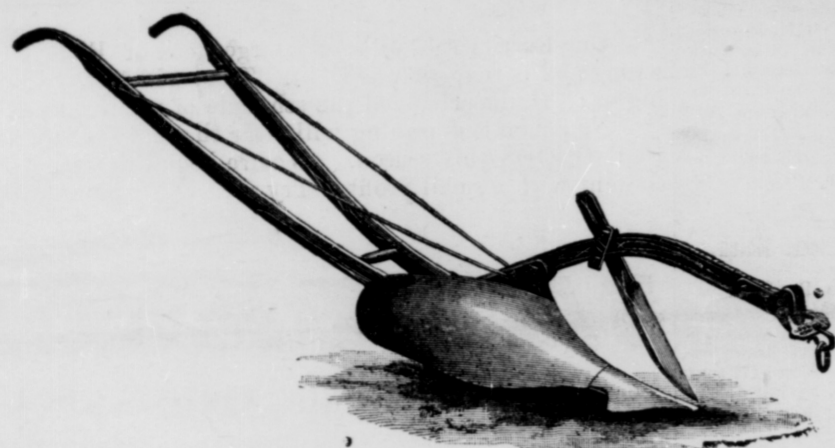

RESTORING SOIL FERTILITY.

The problem which confronts many farmers is how to increase the productive capacity of their farms.

It is not difficult to find the fact that the farm, while being improved, must provide a living for the people who own it, together with pay for the labor employed in working it.

Heretofore it has been these necessities that have obliged farmers to grow and sell the more extensive crops because by a by-stander, the man merely jumped on her back and rode quietly away.

Some portion of the farm should every year be devoted to growing corn, which, as a fertilizer, is the best of all.

As a fertilizer, it is the best of all. It is, however, much more than such land would produce in any kind of grass. The farmer who is aiming mainly to increase the fertility of his land will see largely with corn and will keep that as long on the ground as is necessary to get the most benefit from it.

Winnipeg, Sept. 17.—The C. P. R. land department are engaged on plans for the irrigation of the Company's lands in those districts of Assiniboia and Alberta lying along the main line.

This portion of the territory would be greatly improved by fertility and rendered more attractive to the eye of the traveler if relieved by growing trees of grass of moderate height. The subject is receiving close attention, and although little will be done this year, it is expected that in the early spring work on the improvements will be started.

A cablegram received in Kingston reports that a company with \$250,000 capital has been organized in England to develop the mining properties in Frontenac, Ontario and adjoining counties. Iron ore and gold-bearing ore will be mined.

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ARABIAN STEEDS.

In the dawn of day and night before their master, says Major General Twissell in an article on "The Arabian Horse." There are no groans in our sense. Black slaves keep the ground clean, and the wives and daughters of the tent folk wait upon the mares and romances become reality when a drooping mare or a motherless foal is taken into the best part of the tent to be nursed.

In villages the mare's shed is close to the habitation in which the family live. The result is that foal and fellowship among the flocks—which are associated in the minds of horses with the human figure. The mares turn as kindly to those around them as Gustavus did to those around him. The youngling takes its own from the dam, and is not afraid of that with which they are all familiar.

Even when full of early tuition Arab men deserve some credit for the fine temper of Arab horses. An Aggregation of Interesting Items for Busy Readers.
