Local Squad Pulls Upset

The St. Dunstan's University hockey team with John Kane handling the coaching chores came up with the biggest upset of the season in Maritime sports circles, when they defeated the St. Francis Xavier University pucksters 6-5 in the Antigonish "band box" Monday night.

The Kanesmen travelled to Antigonish as definite underdogs to meet a team that was just fresh from a 4-1 triumph over the Toronto Marlboros, the Toronto Maple Leafs' number one junior 'A' team and the defending Memorial Cup champions.

With this being considered the X-Men were definitely the pre-game favorites, but the Red and White forces "took the bull by the horns" and thrilled Island sports followers by humbling the proud Antigonish aggregation in the all-important four-point contest in the Saints' quest for their first and only Maritime Interscholastic hockey championship since 1947. Hustling Rex McCarville scored for the Saints early in the opening frame and the visitors were leading 2-0 at the close of the opening stanza. The Saints outscored the X-Men 3-1 in the second frame and were leading 5-1 in the final period. The home team came on strong in an effort to pull the all important contest out of the fire, but the Kanesmen held on to their lead and Morell's Mike Kelly rifled home the winner for the Mahesque Road students to give them a stranglehold on the Maritime championship.

Sincere congratulations are in order to 'the boys from the hill' with John Kane at the helm from the pen of the author of Sports Beat. St. Dunstan's will entertain the University of Moncton on home ice this Saturday.

Floyds Wins Decision

Floyd Patterson showed too much boxing savvy as he won a unanimous decision over Canadian heavyweight champion George Chuvalo in Madison Square Garden, Monday night. We had picked Chuvalo to defeat Patterson with the hope that the big Canadian would be able to land a good stiff one on Patterson's reportedly "glass jaw" but Floyd showed he was capable of handling everything the big lad from Toronto could throw at him.

Patterson who is a millionaire is a strange man of numerous hidden complexes, and he trains as endlessly all year as if he didn't have a dime. Floyd is obsessed by the desire for one more bout with Charles "Sonny Boy" Liston who twice flattened Patterson in world heavyweight championship bouts. He is hoping to get a shot at Clay and deliver the flaming mouthed champion and then take one more crack at Liston and if he beats the 'ugly bear' retire from the ring for good.

Patterson's hands move so fast that he is widely thought of as a fine boxer when actually, he isn't. He uses the swiftness of his hands and his combinations as his main defence and is far more effective when advancing than when retreating. Unfortunately for him this style invites too many clouts on the jaw, which he apparently can't absorb.

Heavyweight champion Cassius Marcellus Clay dubbed Patterson the Rabbit during Floyd's training for Chuvalo because of Patterson's sorry performance against Sonny Liston in his two championship bouts with the 'ugly bear'. Although, we think Floyd was probably impressed with Liston's reputation and size and sensed that he was walking into a meat chopper he did walk in and—twice too.

Floyd was knocked down seven times in his first title fight with Ingemar Johansson, but he got up every time and was still trying to fight when he was counted out on his feet and Rabbit who are timid and skittish animals just don't do things like that. We wish Patterson the best of luck on his crusade to redeem himself as a top notch heavyweight champion, and we would do the same for anyone we thought had a chance of taking Cassius Clay's heavyweight championship.
