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Yankees Defeat Detroit For Eighth Straight Win

 You couldn't blame Western cities in the American League for shouting a healthy "good riddance" as the Yankees headed for New York and home yesterday.

The Bronx Bombers completed their first swing through the west without one loss, by whipping Detroit 6-4 for their eighth straight victory and their 13th in 14 games. Tommy Byrne, a "tiger tamer" from way back needed help from Joe Page in the eighth to save his fourth decision. Byrne now holds a 10-2 edge over Detroit during his major-league career.

Yogi Berra's grand-slam homer off Art Houtteman in the fifth provided the victory margin. It gave Byrne a 6-0 edge, but he was routed in the eighth on homers by George Kell and Hoot Evers.

The victory left the Yankees 3-2 games ahead of Boston Red Sox who needed a grand-slam home run by Walt Drop to win a slugfest from the St. Louis Browns 13-12.

Vern Stephens belted his ninth circuit clout in the third inning with two on to put the Sox back in the contest after the Browns had jumped on Ellis Kinder for five runs in the second. Al Zarilla and Clyde Volmer also pounded the ball out of the park in the course of Boston's 19-hit assault.

Home runs by Paul Lehner, Sam Chapman and Pete Suder, plus Bobby Shantz's six-hit pitching, gave Philadelphia Athletics a 6-1 triumph over Chicago White Sox. The game was called after six innings because of rain.

The victory enabled the A's to wind up their first western trip with a record of three victories in 10 games.

At Cleveland, Bob Lemon pitched a three-hitter as the Indians shut out Washington Senators 3-0. The victory moved the Tribe into a fourth-place tie with the losers.

Over in the National League, Brooklyn Dodgers ended a successful home stand, defeating Chicago Cubs 5-4 for their ninth victory in 12 Ebbets Field starts.

The season's smallest crowd - 4,586 paid customers - saw Preacher Roe register his fourth victory against two defeats. Home runs by George Shuba and Roy Campanella featured Brooklyn's 12-hit attack on Bill Voiselle. Walt Dubiel

Yankees Sell Wakefield To Pacific Coast League

 DETROIT, May 25 (AP)—New York Yankees today sold Dick Wakefield to Oakland of the Pacific Coast League, but the big outfielder stuck to his assertions that he won't play minor-league ball.

A one-sentence announcement by the Yankees said the sale was effected for an undisclosed price after all clubs in the American and National Leagues had waived on him.

The sale marked another chapter in the chain of events that began April 28 when Wakefield refused to report to Chicago White Sox after the Yankees sold him to that American League club.

Wakefield, a lonesome spectator at the Detroit-New York game here today, heard the news from the Yankee travelling secretary, Frank Scott, just before game time.

The forthcoming games, in addition to providing good entertainment, will give the clubs a little idea of one another's strength and a chance to limber up in actual competition before they meet one another in scheduled play when the three-team Island League opens at Summerside on June 7th. The C and B boys, last year's Provincial champions, have already had a test of strength this season when they scored a 4-1 victory over Summerside R.C.A.F., the third entry in the league, at Summerside in an exhibition tilt on the 24th of May. Next Sunday's game, however, will be the first of the season for the local Abbie club.

While referring to a five pound, six ounce trout caught by Herbert Sorrey of Montague, in competition for the special trophy donated by the Sport Lodge for the biggest trout landed up to and including May 24th, it was mentioned in this column on Tuesday "it would take some going to outport Mr. Sorrey's prize catch." But that is just what happened.

Messrs Jack Brown and Cecil Dowling, the donors of the trophy, informed us yesterday that Edgar Taylor of Freetown, a lad of about 10 years of age, is the final winner of the competition and the trophy. He topped Mr. Sorrey's entry by four and one half ounces with his five pounds, ten and one half ounce trout, caught at Scales Pond near Freetown. Congratulations, Edgar, that took some doing, but you did it.

"The major baseball teams of the Province, comprising the New Brunswick Baseball League," states a recent report from Fredericton, decided against affiliation with the New Brunswick Baseball Association, organized this year to embrace surviving teams from the defunct York County, Southern New Brunswick and South Coast Leagues. The New Brunswick League will operate independently.

"Teams in the league," continues the report, "are Fredericton Capitals, champions of the 1949 edition of the York County Baseball League; Black's Harbor Brunswicks, winners of the South Coast Baseball League last year; Saint John St. Peter's and Saint John Dodgers of the same league; and Moncton Legionaires who competed in the Southern New Brunswick Baseball League a year ago.

"There was no official comment on the surprise move," quotes the report, "but a spokesman for one team summed it up this way: 'There is no point in affiliation with the New Brunswick body. Nothing would be gained by the league or teams.' Regarding Mac-tine playoffs, he said the league planned to make its own arrangements with the Senior A winners in Nova Scotia. The New Brunswick League is the only Senior A organization in the Province.

OTTAWA, May 25 (CP)—The CBC Board of Governors today recommended against the granting of a licence for a radio station in Langley Prairie, B. C., but recommended in favor of a licence for a Toronto station to be operated by Foster Hewitt, well-known hockey broadcaster.

The board also recommended against a new bid from Harold A. Corning for a station at St. Stephen, N. B. Action was deferred on the application of the Dauphin Broadcasting Company Limited for a station at Dauphin, Man.

The recommendations were among the main ones made by the Board of Governors which met in public session Tuesday to hear oral representations on a number of applications affecting radio in various parts of the country.

Mr. Hewitt, whose broadcasts of National Hockey League Saturday night games in Toronto reach thousands of Canadian homes, told the board that his station would devote a large part of its time to broadcasting of sports events. He said he planned to continue as a sports announcer while operating the station.

His station will operate at 1400 on the dial.
